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LETTER FROM THE CHAIRPERSON

Children are pure energy, positivity and hope, their smiles make the future a place to desire and build together.

Every day, we are passionately committed to supporting children in need, so that no one is left behind. We want the next generation to grow up in a meaningful environment, full of opportunities, and in turn create fairer societies.

According to Agenda 2030, there are 17 major challenges that are larger than our time, and global commitment is required to achieve a more equitable, supportive and prosperous world for all. **To achieve these goals, we need to work together.** And it is only thanks to the people who support us and the work of the many associations we partner with, including through the Spanish Delegation, that **in 2024 we were able to fund 310 projects in different parts of the world, providing more than €9.4 million,** mainly through education, welfare and health-related initiatives.

In Italy, we focused on the issue of early school leaving, supporting 860 **minors at risk of dropping out of school**, not only due to financial difficulties but also emotional struggles linked to learning disorders.

Abroad, we took comprehensive action to support **families living in poverty, building housing, distributing food and medicines, and digging wells to ensure access to drinking water.** And let us not

forget the people affected by the terrible **emergencies** that have struck various countries, such as the **Wars** in the Middle East and the devastating **Dana flood** in Spain, which in an instant left people with nothing.

We had set ourselves a goal: to help 300,000 children in need by 2030.

Over our long journey of more than 20 years, we have **already helped over 281,000 people worldwide, 60,000 of them in 2024 alone.**

A result that makes us proud and motivates us to do even better. **Together, the goal is within reach;** we can, and we want to, get there ahead of schedule.

And we will succeed.

Because, together, the future is closer.

METHODOLOGICAL NOTE

In Italy, the reform of the Third Sector led to the publication of the "Guidelines for preparing the Annual Report of Third Sector Organisations". These guidelines were adopted by Decree of the Italian Ministry of Labour and Social Policies on 4 July 2019.

This document has been drawn up in accordance with Art. 14 of Italian Legislative Decree No. 117/2017, examines the year 2024 and constitutes the fifth Fondazione Mediolanum report in this area.

The Annual Report is a fundamental tool for all organisations operating in the Third Sector, not only because it offers them the opportunity to be accountable to donors and stakeholders for their work, but also because it stimulates useful reflections to weigh up the organisation's future choices.

Stakeholders and their involvement are, without a doubt, the true heart of the Annual Report, and sounding their interest and what they perceive in relation to the Foundation's activities is necessary in planning the topics to be pursued.

In 2024, thanks to the interviews and suggestions gathered, the materiality analysis was updated. It was used to measure the importance of the topics addressed by the Foundation and their impact on stakeholders.

MATERIALITY ANALYSIS

The update of the materiality analysis has been structured in accordance with the requirements of the 2021 edition of the Global Reporting Initiative (GRI) Sustainability Reporting Standards. This new assessment shifts the focus from relevant topics towards the impacts they generate.

The evolution of the process of identifying and defining the topics for the materiality analysis has directly involved the stakeholders through a structured process of stakeholder engagement. This has allowed us to identify the issues and aspects of Fondazione Mediolanum that have a significant impact.

In particular, a **selection of topics deemed of material interest to the Foundation and its stakeholders was carried out**, updating and aligning the previous material topics with the most recent operational and strategic directives adopted by the Foundation. Subsequently, with the methodological support of ALTIS Advisory, a spin-off of the Università Cattolica, the current and potential positive and negative impacts were identified for each topic considered material.

These impacts were assessed through the direct involvement **of 82 representatives from ten identified stakeholder categories, who completed a questionnaire**: Mediolanum Values Managers, beneficiaries, external donors, internal donors, volunteers, the Foundation team, external suppliers, the media, testimonials, and non-profit organisation networks.

For each topic, respondents were asked to anonymously rate their assessment on a scale of 1 to 5, as follows:

The analysis of the data collected, the assessment and prioritisation of impacts resulted in a list of material topics ranked in decreasing order of significance, from most to least significant. The data shows a strong emphasis on implementing effective and meaningful projects, with a particular focus on health, education and assistance.

In particular, **the effectiveness of projects is the topic that obtained the highest score, with an average of 3.88**, focusing on the relevance of the impact generated on the funded organisations. These organisations are able to manage and implement projects for minors, achieving their objectives through well-defined actions capable of delivering results.

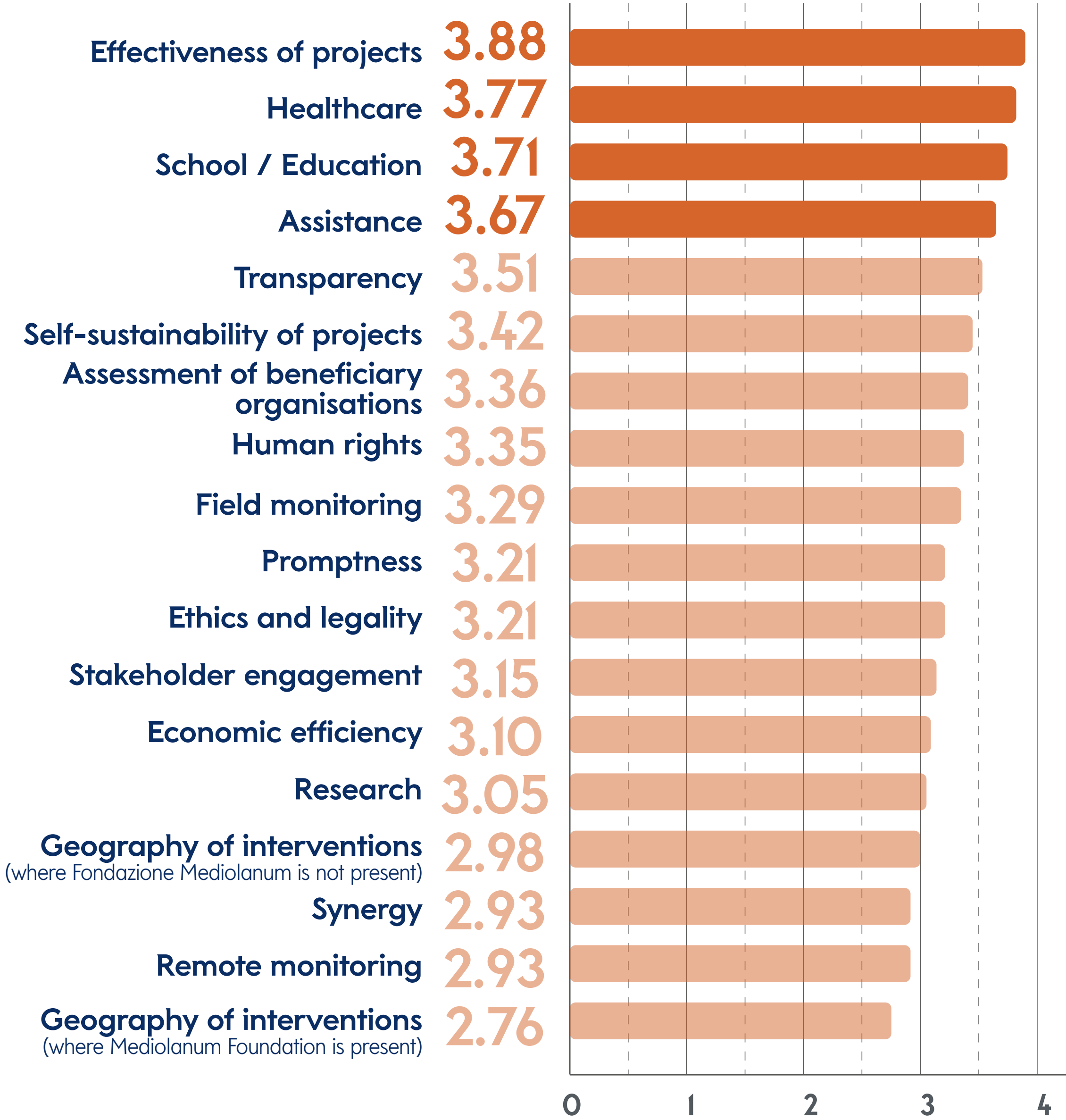
Projects in the healthcare sector, with a score of 3.77, rank second in order of importance and represent the impact on improving minors' living conditions through access to healthcare, hospital and reception facilities, including for families accompanying minors to receive treatment in regions other than those in which they live, and the implementation

of vaccination and/or treatment campaigns for specific diseases. This includes interventions for the construction and maintenance of healthcare and hospital facilities, accommodation for families accompanying minors to receive treatment in foreign countries, and vaccination and treatment campaigns for specific pathologies. The focus on healthcare highlights the importance of ensuring access to high-quality medical care and supporting healthcare infrastructure.

This is followed by the school and education area, which stands at an average of 3.71. These interventions not only improve school facilities, but also provide healthcare and food for the pupils. This score underlines the Foundation's commitment to promoting the education and well-being of children, recognising the importance of education integrated with healthcare and nutritional support.

Assistance projects ranked fourth, according to stakeholders, with a score of 3.67. These interventions aim to improve the living conditions of minors who are in vulnerable situations, who are orphans or from troubled families, or whose life is in danger due to lack of sustenance.

In summary, the relevance assigned and the list of material topics identified represent the issues on which Fondazione Mediolanum will focus its future strategies and activities for the Annual Report in the coming years, always with the aim of supporting the most vulnerable children and ensuring that they receive the help they need to improve their living conditions.

Presentation and purposes
of Fondazione Mediolanum



1.1 FONDAZIONE MEDIOLANUM

Fondazione Mediolanum was established on 3 December 2001 and pursues exclusively philanthropic purposes in the fields of culture and art in all their forms, education, training, assistance, scientific research, the environment and health, in accordance with Art. 10 paragraph 1 no. 3 of Italian Legislative Decree 460/1997, both in Italy and in Spain, through a specific delegation.

On 2 September 2020, the Foundation amended its articles of association in compliance with the provisions of Italian Legislative Decree 117/2017 (known as the "Third Sector Code") to achieve the status of Philanthropic Organisation. The new statutory text came into force in 2023, following the organisation's registration in the Single National Register of the Third Sector ("RUNTS").

However, the institutional purposes of the Foundation have not undergone any substantial changes, except for the regulatory references, which will be those provided for in the Third Sector Code.

Following its registration with RUNTS (Single National Register of the Third Sector) and the subsequent entry into force of the new articles of association, the Foundation aims to pursue civic, charitable and social utility purposes through the provision of money, goods or services, including investments, to support disadvantaged categories of people or activities of general interest. It exclusively or primarily engages in charitable activities, provides remote support, supplies free

food or products, or provides money, goods and services in support of disadvantaged people or activities of general interest in accordance with Art. 5, paragraph 1, of the Third Sector Code.

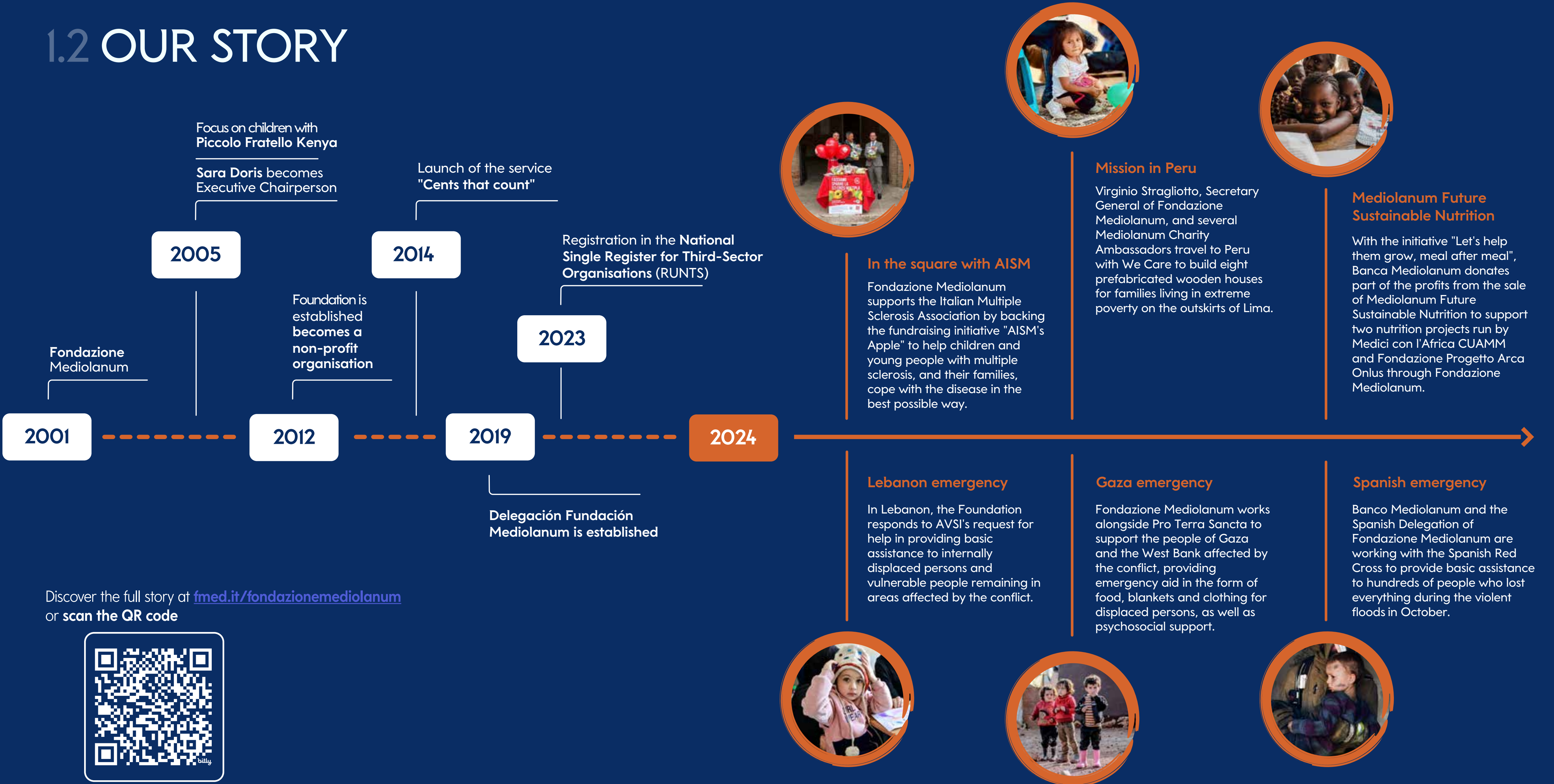
Fondazione Mediolanum was established by the following Founder: Banca Mediolanum S.p.A.

1.3 MISSION

Educating today's children about freedom, so that they can be the free adults of tomorrow.

Since 2005, the Foundation has decided to focus its projects on helping children in difficult conditions.

The Foundation believes that children are particularly vulnerable and weak in society, which is why it is essential that they are given the right opportunities to grow, develop their talents, and become free and independent in their environment and in real life.

The Foundation has established a policy for selecting the projects it supports, based on the reliability, effectiveness and efficiency of its project partners.

Partners must describe the situation of hardship and the number of children involved, as well as the intervention plan to mitigate or resolve the situation and the timeframe. The Foundation will then check whether the intervention has had the desired effect, through the stories of the young beneficiaries.

Since 2005, the Foundation has funded 1,557 projects in 56 countries around the world, including Italy, providing more than €46 million to help over 281,000 children in need.

1.4 2030 AGENDA GOALS

The United Nations 2030 Agenda is a global action plan to end poverty, protect the planet and ensure prosperity for all by 2030.

The Agenda was adopted in September 2015 by all 193 Member States of the United Nations and comprises 17 interconnected Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

These goals include ending poverty, combating hunger, promoting health and wellbeing, providing access to quality education, reducing inequalities, promoting

justice and peace, combating climate change, and protecting biodiversity.

The SDGs are universally applicable and require the commitment of all countries, both industrialised and developing, to achieve a sustainable future for all.

In line with its mission to support children in need, the Foundation has intervened, through the projects it supports, in the following eight sustainable development goals:





In 2024, in line with the first of the 2030 Agenda's sustainable development goals, "End poverty", Fondazione Mediolanum supported various initiatives to **ensure that everyone has access to essential resources and services, such as food, clean water, adequate housing, healthcare, education and decent work.**

For example, with the **"Right to housing and food" project** by Fondazione Progetto Arca Onlus, we provided **support to children and families in poverty at risk of housing emergencies**, helping them to maintain family unity and initiating socio-economic integration pathways through **social housing and solidarity market services**. In addition, through Missioni Ets's housing emergency projects, we **helped improve hygiene, health, relationship stability and safety for families in the slums** of Villa Maria del Triunfo in Lima (Peru), and Posadas (Argentina), **by building 60 prefabricated houses.**



In line with the second goal of the United Nations 2030 Agenda, namely "Zero Hunger", which aims to **ensure that every person has access to safe, nutritious and sufficient food to lead a healthy and active life**, we supported various initiatives to combat malnutrition and help families in need to provide proper nutritional support to their children.

For example, we collaborated with Doctors for Africa CUAMM on **life-saving interventions for severely malnourished children in Sierra Leone**, providing them with appropriate care. In Italy, we supported families living in poverty by providing **food and baby supplies through the Social Markets of Progetto Arca Foundation**, which allow the distribution of practical aid to those most in need. Furthermore, with Ketuko Onlus's "Children's Food" project **in Namibia, we helped secure the Citadel of Mercy**, an important place that also houses the Soup Kitchen, which **distributes around 400 meals a day to nursery school children and teenagers, guaranteeing them a hot and nutritious meal.**



In line with the third goal of the 2030 Agenda, "Health and Well-being", we undertook various initiatives to **ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all**, at all ages.

Together with the Buzzi Children's Hospital Foundation, we **created a new waiting room designed specifically for children**, which is warmer and more welcoming, at the new large Buzzi Hospital in Milan. In collaboration with AISM, we worked to **improve the quality of life of children and teenagers affected by multiple sclerosis**, helping them to better manage the challenges associated with this disease. Finally, with Vidas, we **supported end-of-life care projects for seriously ill children**, offering free social and healthcare to newborns, children and adolescents with incurable diseases at the Casa Sollievo Bimbi paediatric hospice.



To help achieve Goal 4 of the 2030 Agenda, "Quality Education", which aims to **ensure inclusive, equitable and high-quality education for all**, eliminate gender disparities in access to education and support vocational and technical training, we carried out various initiatives both in Italy and abroad throughout the year.

To combat early school leaving, we contributed to educational support activities at the Casa dell'Amicizia in Rome through the **"Free to grow"** project, in collaboration with the Community of Sant'Egidio. Furthermore, with Alice for Children, we **established the first Digital School in the slums of Nairobi**, equipped with a fully-fitted computer lab for secondary school students.



The fifth goal of the 2030 Agenda regards gender equality, namely the **elimination of inequalities between men and women in all aspects of life**.

To help ensure access to justice for all, promote the empowerment of women and girls, and ensure equal opportunities and resources, with Woman for Freedom Ets, **through the "At school with Chiara" project, we provided support for the reintegration into school of 240 girls aged between 6 and 17 who were at risk of early marriage**. In addition, with Protection 4 Kids' "Me for her" project, **we created a listening room to offer free counselling on incidents of gender-based violence**.



In line with the sixth goal, "Clean water and sanitation", which aims to **ensure universal access to drinking water and sanitation** and promote safe and sustainable hygiene practices, we carried out various projects in the most disadvantaged countries.

We **built a well in Mabuni, Kenya**, with our partner Insieme Per Donare Un Sorriso Odv, in order to guarantee water to support the cultivation of vegetables and poultry farming, which are essential for feeding school children. Together with Associazione DA MAN, we **built bathrooms for the population of Toubia Merina, Senegal**, to ensure adequate hygiene conditions and prevent disease. Finally, with ACRA's "Water for Bolana" project, we **helped to ensure that 700 children in Guinea Bissau could have access to sanitation facilities and drinking water**.



The eighth goal of the 2030 Agenda aims to **promote long-term inclusive and sustainable economic growth, with decent and productive jobs and safe and favourable working conditions**. In this sense, we focused both on able-bodied young people without opportunities, who come from fragile economic backgrounds, and on young people with disabilities. Supporting these young people, both in Italy and abroad, enables them to integrate into society with dignity and prospects for the future.

In Italy, with the **"Learning to work" project** by the non-profit organisation I Gigli del Campo Association, we **gave disabled young people the opportunity to learn to work in real-life contexts**, experiencing the usefulness of their commitment to the local area. Through the **Aslam Cooperativa Sociale's "Let's see hope bloom" project**, we **helped provide young men and women** from economically and socially disadvantaged backgrounds with the **skills needed to fill the professional roles most sought after by companies in Lombardy**.



In line with Goal 16 of the United Nations 2030 Agenda, which aims to **promote peaceful, just and inclusive societies for all**, we took action to ensure the protection of human rights and fundamental freedoms in humanitarian emergencies related to armed conflicts.

For the **emergency in Gaza and the West Bank**, together with Pro Terra Sancta, we organised the **distribution of basic necessities, shelter and psychosocial support for displaced persons**, while with AVSI we responded to the **emergency in Lebanon** by promptly providing **water and food supplies, mattresses, blankets, shelters, hygiene kits and other essential goods**.



1.5 LINES OF INTERVENTION

The goals the Foundation aspires to pursue are achieved through the provision of money, goods or services to support disadvantaged children, in line with its mission and taking into account the relevant aspects identified through discussions with stakeholders. For the selection of the projects to finance, Fondazione Mediolanum has decided to prioritise **five intervention areas, based on the requests for aid received**.

These areas include:

Assistance

The Foundation focuses on helping minors in vulnerable situations, such as orphans, unaccompanied children, or children with problematic families or whose lives are in danger due to a lack of sustenance. In addition, the Foundation provides rehabilitation and support programmes for those who have suffered serious illnesses or have disabilities, as well as protecting victims of violence and helping those with deviant behaviour

School

The Foundation funds the construction and maintenance of school facilities, especially in the poorest countries, which provide healthcare and food to young students. Continuity in education is important for the development of children's personality and psyche.

Healthcare

The Foundation funds the construction and maintenance of healthcare and hospital facilities, with particular attention paid to paediatrics and gynaecology/maternity departments. It also supports vaccination and treatment campaigns for the most common diseases, especially in countries where access to medical care is limited.

Research

The Foundation supports research to find new treatments and guarantee access to necessary care for all.

Human Rights

The Foundation is committed to directly supporting the recognition of rights, such as the right to citizenship, to access to healthcare and education, and to childhood, in efforts to eliminate child labour and arranged marriages, instead of simply raising the population's awareness.

The above is confirmed through the following activities:

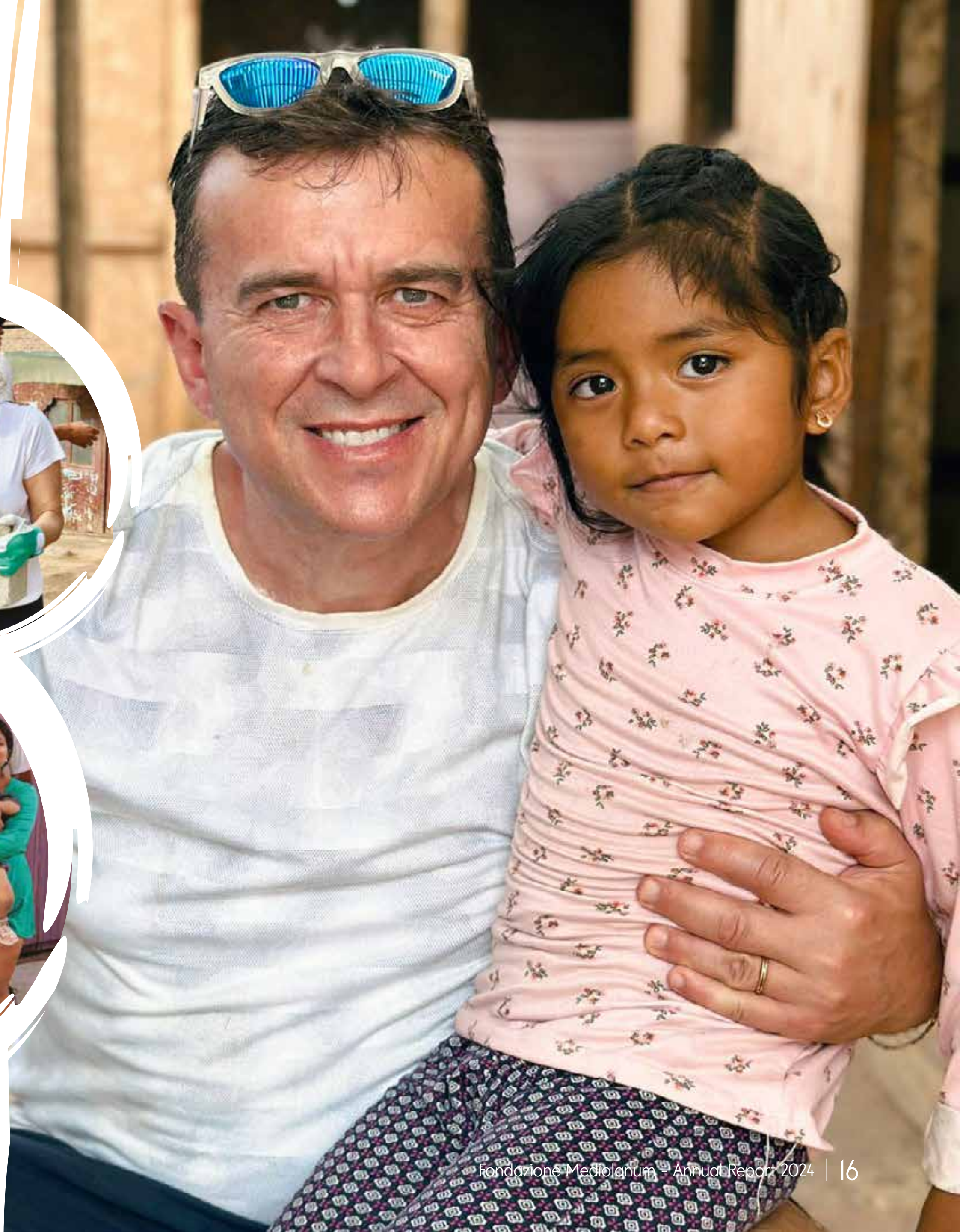
Planning through the preparation and offering of interventions and activities aimed at removing and overcoming the conditions of need and hardship of the identified beneficiaries.

Organisation of services and initiatives to help and support people experiencing hardships who need social and healthcare support interventions, with particular reference to minors.

Granting of free gifts in cash and/or in-kind to disadvantaged, distressed and needy persons, with particular attention to children.

Granting of free cash disbursements by using sums from asset management or donations and offers specifically collected for non-profit organisations, which mainly operate in the sectors referred to in the first paragraph of Article 5 of the Third Sector Code, for the direct implementation of social utility projects.

The Foundation also carries out activities to raise awareness and share information on all issues related to its area of interest, using all the communication tools at its disposal, in accordance with the provisions of Article 6 of the Third Sector Code. Some of these activities might include the promotion and management, directly and/or indirectly, of the publication of books, periodicals, newsletters, surveys and research, including through electronic tools, in accordance with institutional purposes.



1.6 METHODS OF INTERVENTION

Fondazione Mediolanum operates as a funding body, financially supporting the projects of other NPOs.

In previous years, the Foundation used traditional forms of disbursement, such as calls for tenders or donations for services, but over time it has developed synergies that best embody its desire to collaborate to enhance interventions.

To better understand the Foundation's disbursement activity, it is useful to examine the channels for the supply of economic resources. The majority of the funds come from donations from the Mediolanum Financial Conglomerate. These funds are used to boost the fundraising of partners.

The Foundation also assesses and chooses the projects that will then be linked to the activities and services of Banca Mediolanum.

Finally, it accepts donations from individuals or companies for specific projects already identified by the donor, with the mandate to verify the organisation, the project and the reporting.



1.6.a Boosting fundraising

Fondazione Mediolanum has decided to replace the practice of granting funds to NPOs for their projects with a new approach based on collaboration to achieve a common fundraising goal. When the goal is reached, the funds raised are doubled as a “bonus”. This mechanism is applied to two types of initiatives. The first involves NPOs reported by the Family Bankers (financial advisors) of Banca Mediolanum, while the second refers to associations with which the Foundation has already collaborated in the past and with which a direct relationship exists. The Foundation also promotes annual fundraisers among its stakeholders, including Family Bankers, customers and employees of Mediolanum, for which a dedicated doubling budget is provided for. The Foundation verifies the organisation, the project and all donations received from individuals or companies for specific projects.

Charity Events

These are fundraising initiatives at the disposal of the Family Bankers of Banca Mediolanum to support projects, in support of disadvantaged children, run by NPOs and local associations with which they are in contact.

Fondazione Mediolanum doubles the amount collected through these events.

These initiatives allow Family Bankers to present themselves not only as expert financial professionals, but also as people of value, committed to helping those who are less fortunate.

The amount raised must be paid into the current account of Fondazione Mediolanum, which is committed to donating the amount collected to the indicated beneficiary organisation after having doubled it, while respecting certain limits:

if the amount collected is less than €2,000, it is not doubled and is transferred in full to the organisation; doubling is applied within a maximum limit of €5,000 per event.

The Family Banker must first request authorisation from Fondazione Mediolanum by submitting the following documentation:

- the articles of association of the beneficiary NPO;
- the last three financial statements available;
- the project sheet with a detailed description of the need, the beneficiaries, the action plan and the duration.

If the event is approved, the funds can be collected in different ways at the discretion of the Family Banker.

This same formula was also successfully proposed in Spain by the Spanish delegation of the Foundation, with the involvement of the Family Bankers of Banco Mediolanum.

Matching Grant Projects

Unlike Charity Events, Matching Grant projects are only evaluated for organisations of reputable standing, many of which the Foundation has already successfully collaborated with in the past. In these initiatives, the participation of a Family Banker is not required and the doubling amount made available by the Foundation can vary considerably, starting from €10,000 and reaching up to €100,000 (in exceptional cases). In addition to constantly monitoring the fundraising, which flows through its current account, the Foundation makes available all its communication channels (website, social media channels and press office activities) and is able to tailor payment methods, for example by providing POS tools for collecting card donations and making available a dedicated PayPal and Stripe account to use.

This model has a dual effect: on the one hand, it encourages donors to reach the minimum doubling goal, boosting their donation; on the other, it increases the visibility of the project, attracting the attention of potential new donors.

Annual fundraising

Fondazione Mediolanum does not limit itself to boosting the fundraisers of the organisations it supports, but rather is actively involved in promoting annual campaigns of NPOs operating in similar areas in Italy. To find a common objective among the projects proposed by the various associations involved (usually 2 or 3 per campaign), the Foundation seeks to identify a common denominator. The total collected during this period is divided equally among the beneficiary associations.

The Foundation has chosen to focus only on Italian projects as the main supporters are the Family Bankers, customers and employees of Banca Mediolanum. In this way, the Foundation offers them national intervention projects, which are very accessible and allow the donor to actively participate in local community.

Every year, Banca Mediolanum organises face-to-face or virtual events to reach new and prospective customers, retain them, and offer information on products and services, sponsorships, etc. Fondazione Mediolanum has the opportunity to promote its fundraising initiatives during these events. Family Bankers are involved, for example, at the National Convention of Banca Mediolanum or during regional return to work meetings. The employees of the Mediolanum Financial Conglomerate are mainly involved in the activities organised during the Christmas and Easter holidays or through temporary outlets created thanks to the material made available

by the Mediolanum Store or the marketing office of Banca Mediolanum.

During these campaigns, Fondazione Mediolanum also provides a doubling budget for donations from their base of supporters that pass through the Foundation's account.

The aim of this method is to keep the beneficiary organisations more active in fundraising and engaged in communication.

1.6.b Initiatives and services of Banca Mediolanum

Fondazione Mediolanum relies on Banca Mediolanum to raise funds, which provides an annual base for its objectives and promotes charitable services and initiatives among its customers.

The Foundation selects the beneficiaries, validates the projects, collects the donations from the Bank and schedules reporting with partner organisations. In these cases, Fondazione Mediolanum does not provide for doubling the funds raised.

“Cents that count” service

Banca Mediolanum's "Cents that count" service allows current account holders to donate small amounts to support solidarity projects promoted and supervised by the Foundation.

The accounting balance is verified on the last day of the month on the accounts with service activated, and if the amount shows cents (e.g., €1,150.22), these are automatically withdrawn and entirely allocated to the projects benefiting from the initiative. The Foundation is responsible for issuing receipts for participating customers, as well as for annual reporting. In addition, as membership to the service grows, with the resulting increase in amounts, the Foundation identifies new beneficiaries among the associations with which it has trusting relationships and that have demonstrated the effectiveness of their projects.

Mediolanum ForYou Rewarding

This is Banca Mediolanum's programme that rewards customer loyalty, allowing customers to accumulate points that can be used to request rewards or experiences from the catalogue of offers. The Mediolanum ForYou Rewarding programme comprises a solidarity section in which Fondazione Mediolanum has included the projects of three partner associations: the projects generally relate to different areas of intervention (assistance, healthcare, education) and are located in different geographical areas, usually in poor countries in Africa, Asia and Central/South America.

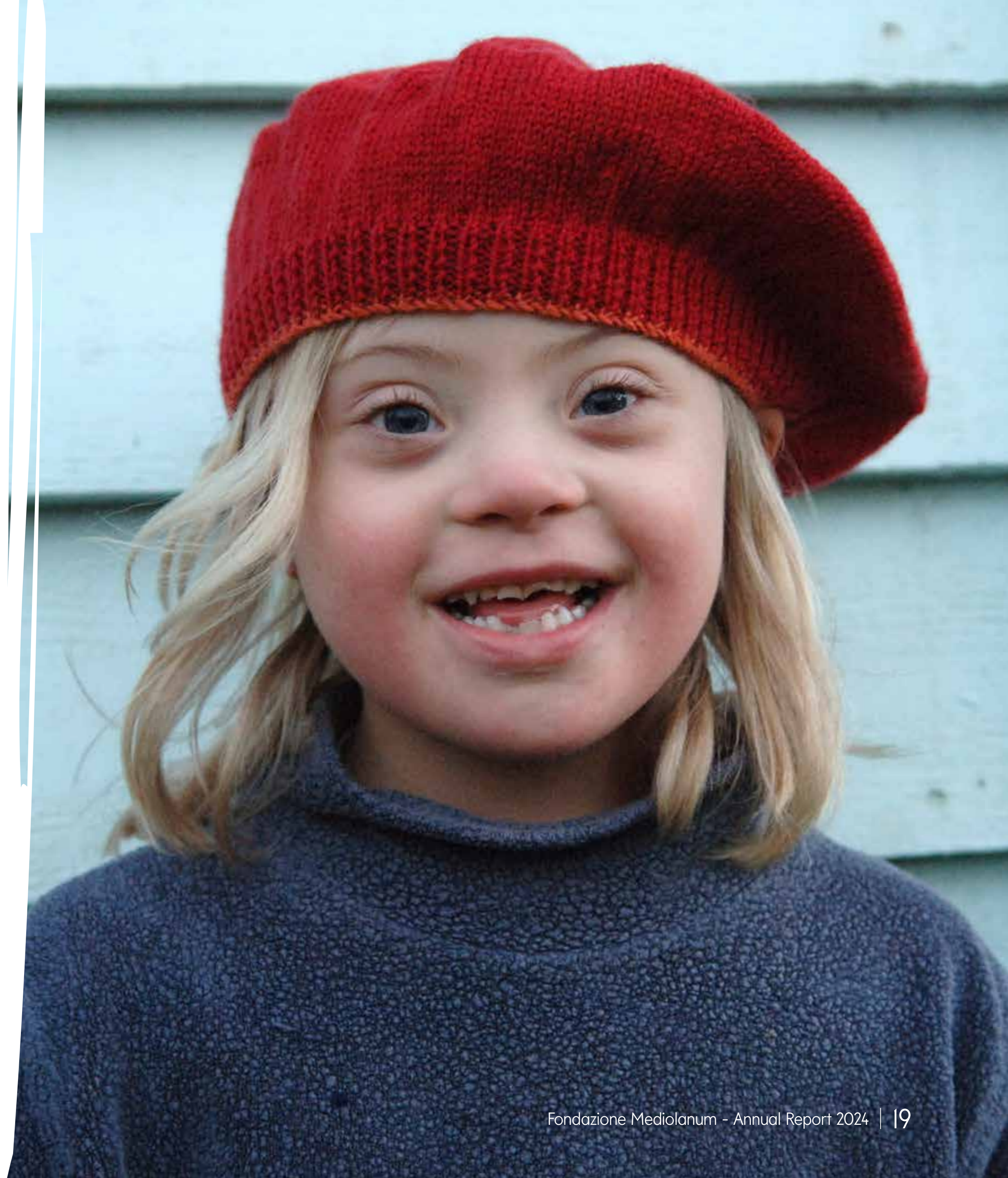
Cause-Related Marketing

This is a marketing strategy that allows a company to support a social cause. Mediolanum's cause-related marketing campaigns run for a limited period of time with a totally charitable purpose and without the promotional component, which would be incompatible with the work of Family Bankers. This is because financial consulting must be customised to the customer's needs and not influenced by promotions on certain products, even in the case of socially useful activities. The project that will benefit from the campaign is national in scope. The Bank selects a panel of products on which, for a given period of

the year, it waives part of the revenues to donate them to charity. The charitable initiatives that are the subject of the campaign are selected by Fondazione Mediolanum, which contacts the partners to create the charitable project, define the beneficiaries and lines of intervention, and oversee reporting. At the end of the initiative, the sums allocated to the projects are transferred to Fondazione Mediolanum account, which donates them in full to the beneficiaries. Furthermore, Banca Mediolanum promotes occasional Cause-Related Marketing initiatives through the Mediolanum Store, where it waives part of the revenue of some products to support the projects proposed by the Foundation. The selection of charitable initiatives is handled by Fondazione Mediolanum, which defines the beneficiaries and the lines of intervention, and oversees reporting. At the end of the period, the sums collected are donated entirely to the beneficiary partner organisation.

1.6.c Direct and in-kind disbursements

Fondazione Mediolanum occasionally receives requests from private donors or other Foundations that are interested in intervening on a certain issue or in a particular area. It is the Foundation's task to explore the panorama of non-profit organisations that deal with the issue indicated and to identify the project most pertinent to the donor's wishes. Once the project has been agreed with the donor, the Foundation acts as guarantor, taking care of the disbursement of funds received through donations or gifts in kind, of the promotion of the initiative through its own channels, and of the reporting. In these cases, there is no doubling of the amount granted. Finally, in exceptional cases, direct disbursements are made to ensure prompt intervention in emergency situations.



1.7 TRANSPARENCY

1.7.a Initial contact

Fondazione Mediolanum does not use public calls for proposals to select the associations and non-profit organisations with which it collaborates. Instead, these entities are chosen after contact, which takes place through the following methods:

- **direct contact with the Foundation**, consolidating relationships through partnerships and common initiatives carried out in previous years;
- **contact brokered by the Family Bankers of Banca Mediolanum**, as is the case for Charitable Events;
- **use of the institutional channels of the Foundation**, such as the email address info@fondazionemediolanum.it, the phone number 02-9049.1 or the social media channels Facebook, Instagram, LinkedIn and X.

1.7.b Evaluation

Fondazione Mediolanum requires prospective NPOs to submit the following documentation:

- **the articles of association;**
- **the last three financial statements available;**
- **description of the project.**

The articles of association are essential to demonstrate that the organisation is an NPO and that the mission is consistent with that of Fondazione Mediolanum, i.e. assisting disadvantaged children.

The last three financial statements are necessary to verify that the organisation has been active for at least three years and to assess the size of the organisation and its efficiency. Considered in particular are the item “revenue” in the income statement and the percentage of costs attributable to project costs with respect to organisation costs.

After examining the position of the organisation, the Foundation assesses the proposed project and decides whether to disburse the required funds.

The Foundation does not finance organisations directly, but only projects that meet certain requirements. In particular, the project must clearly describe the situation of hardship, have defined and verifiable beneficiaries among the minors in difficulty, describe the intervention and the expected time frame and explain how the situation will move from the situation of hardship to a new condition in which the difficulty will be resolved in whole or in part.

For the presentation of the projects, a management system was created in collaboration with the Accenture Foundation, which allows the proposing organisations, through a guided process, to submit to the Foundation both the above documents and the project they intend to implement. This is an online application in which the beneficiary organisations can enter all the information necessary to present a project for which they request the support of Fondazione Mediolanum.

The website is structured to enable access, in addition to the data relating to the identity of the organisation, the financial statements and the articles of association, to all information relating to the project.

The organisation may, therefore, first in summary and then in detail, present the project, indicating:

- **the area of intervention;**
- **the geographical area;**
- **the disadvantaged situation in which it will intervene;**

- **the number of minors expected to be supported;**
- **other useful information regarding the self-sustainability of the project and its impact.**

1.7.c Approval

After evaluating the articles of association, the last three financial statements and the project sheet submitted by the organisation, the Foundation authorises the fundraising activities, providing communication support through a dedicated media plan, administrative management of donations received with daily updates, and management of the relevant receipts to take advantage of tax benefits.

1.7.d Disbursement

Upon completion of the fundraising, which may last for a variable period based on the partner's needs, but always within the calendar year in which the collection began, Fondazione Mediolanum will disburse the funds raised and the relative amount for the doubling initially agreed.

1.7.e Reporting

On the basis of the deadlines envisaged for the implementation of the project, the beneficiary organisation must submit detailed expense tracking showing exactly how the loans disbursed by Fondazione Mediolanum will be used.

In addition to financial reporting, the organisation is required to provide an assessment of the impact of the project, describing how this has affected the lives of the children involved.

For projects of particular importance, the Foundation plans to carry out audit missions, especially for those carried out abroad, in which members of the Foundation staff and/or volunteers participate.

2.1 THE BODIES OF FONDAZIONE MEDIOLANUM

Board of Directors

This consists of three to nine members appointed by the **Board of Directors of Banca Mediolanum S.p.A.** and by its **Chairperson**.

The latter remain in office for three financial years and can be reappointed, unless revoked by the person who appointed them before the expiry of the mandate.

If the Founder cannot or does not wish to appoint the members of the Board of Directors when their mandate is due to expire, their mandate is considered extended until the appointment of the members of the Board of Directors by the Founder.

The terms of office of the Directors, regardless of the date of their appointment, expire simultaneously.

Members of the Board of Directors who, without a justified reason, fail to participate in three consecutive meetings of the Board may be declared dismissed from the Board.

In this case, as in any other case of time off from the office of Director, the Board of Directors must co-opt another Director(s), who shall remain in office until the expiry of the mandate of the other Directors. The Board of Directors holds all powers for the ordinary and extraordinary administration of the Foundation.

In particular, it:

- Passes resolutions **on the annual balance sheet**, the **annual budget**, the **accompanying** and **financial** report, and the **Annual Report**;

- Passes resolution on the acceptance of **donations, gifts, legacies, inheritances** and **bequests**, as well as **on the purchase and sale of real estate** and on the use of the same or of the sums obtained, in compliance with the limits provided for by the articles of association;
- Identifies the **areas of activity of the Foundation**;
- Passes resolutions, with the favourable vote of the majority of the members in office, on any **amendments to the Articles of Association**;
- **Confers special assignments to individual Directors**, also with the power of delegation, establishing their responsibilities;
- Resolves on, with the favourable vote of a four-fifths majority of the members, the **dissolution of the Foundation**, the **appointment of the liquidators** and the **devolution of assets** pursuant to these Articles of Association;
- Establishes, if deemed necessary or appropriate for the needs of the Foundation, **Committees** or **Commissions** with advisory and/or coordination functions;
- Carries out any **further tasks** entrusted to it by these Articles of Association.

If deemed appropriate, the **Board of Directors may establish an Executive Committee** composed of three members, including the Chairperson, **to whom specific tasks relating to ordinary administration may be delegated**.

The Executive Committee is regulated, where applicable and with the necessary adjustments, by the same rules applicable to the Board of Directors. The office of Director is not remunerated, except for the reimbursement of expenses incurred in fulfilling office, where required.

The Board of Fondazione Mediolanum **met twice** in 2024, on the following dates:

- **24 January**
- **24 June**

The following topics were discussed during the meetings:

- **discussion of the 2023 financial statements and approval of the 2024 forecast**
- **approval of the 2023 annual report**
- **appointment of the WST firm for the drafting of the risk assessment and subsequent approval of the 23I model** in order to provide the Foundation with the necessary tools to be exempt from administrative liability 23I

Chairperson of the Foundation

The Chairperson of the Foundation is the Chairperson of the Board of Directors and is appointed by the Board of Directors of Mediolanum S.p.A. and, for it,

by its Chairperson from among the members of the Foundation's Board of Directors. If the Founder cannot or does not wish to appoint the Chairperson, the latter will be appointed internally by the Board of Directors. **The Chairperson shall remain in office for three financial years and can be reappointed.**

The Chairperson generally represents the Foundation vis-à-vis third parties. Brings and opposes actions before any administrative or judicial authority. The Chairperson oversees the operational and organisational management of the Foundation, giving the appropriate instructions to the structure, and is responsible for relations with Organisations, Institutions, Public and Private Companies, and other bodies in order to establish collaborative relationships and support the Foundation's individual initiatives.

Secretary General

He/she is appointed by the Chairperson, including from within the Board of Directors, shall remain in office for three financial years and may be reappointed. At the time of appointment, the nature and qualification of the office of the Secretary are established.

With regard to the powers conferred upon him/her at the time of appointment or provided for in these Articles of Association, **he/she has full decision-making autonomy, and signing and authorisation powers, within the scope of the programmes, of the development plans of the Foundation** and the allocations approved by its Board of Directors.

He/she is the operational manager of the Foundation and, if not a member of the Board of Directors, may attend Board meetings.

Supervisory Body

This may be a single member or collective body according to the decisions taken upon appointment by the Founder.

It monitors compliance with the Law and the Articles of Association and compliance with the principles of proper administration and with the suitability of the organisational, administrative and accounting structure adopted by the Foundation and its effective organisation.

It may also carry out independent audits.

The members of the Supervisory Body have the right to participate, without voting rights, in the meetings of the Board of Directors.

If a collective body, the Supervisory Body is composed of three members, at least one of whom must be enrolled in the register of auditors.

The members of the Supervisory Body remain in office for three financial years and can be reappointed. The provisions of Art. 2399 of the Italian Civil Code apply to members of the Supervisory Body. The role of member of the Supervisory Body is not compatible with that of member of the Board of Directors.

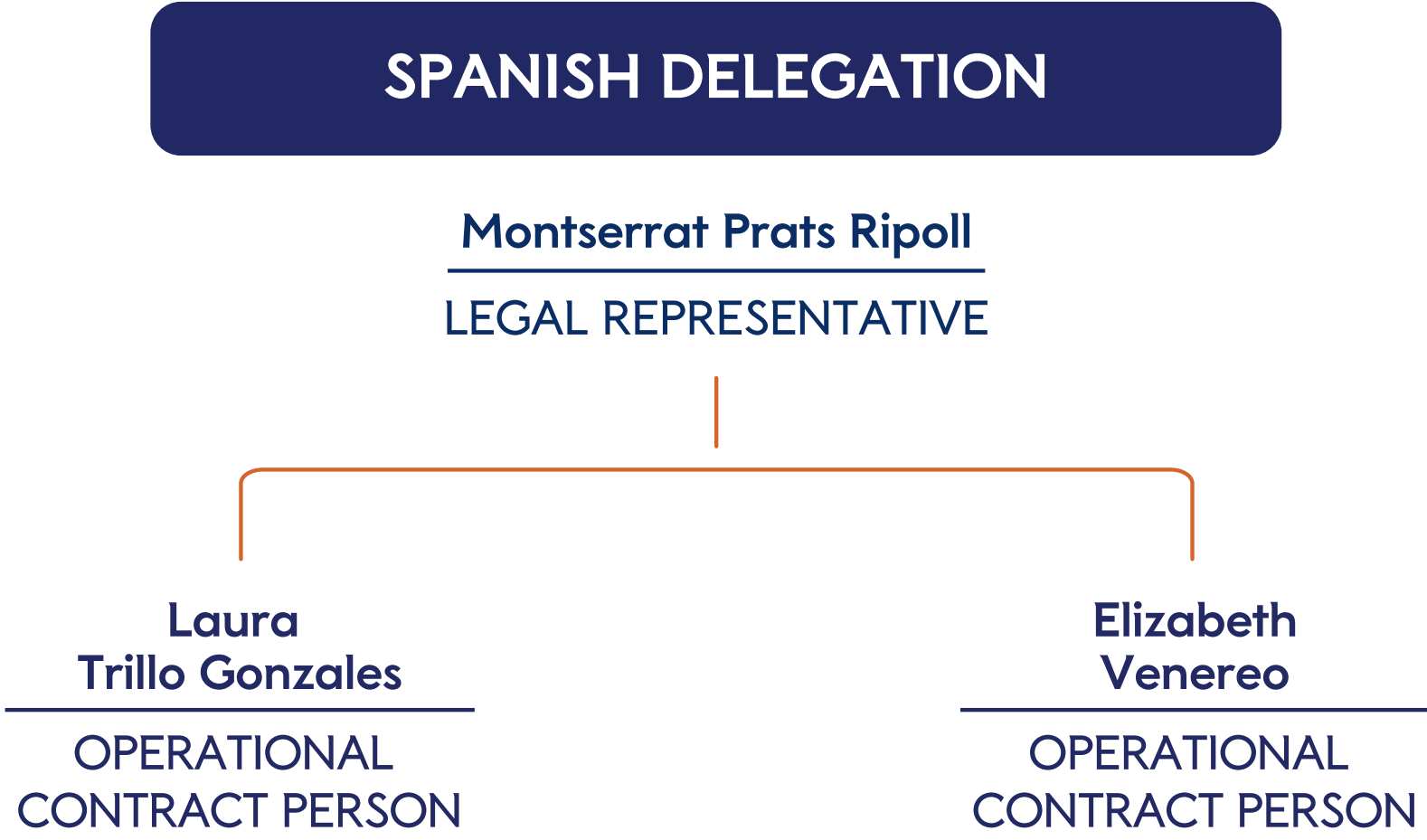
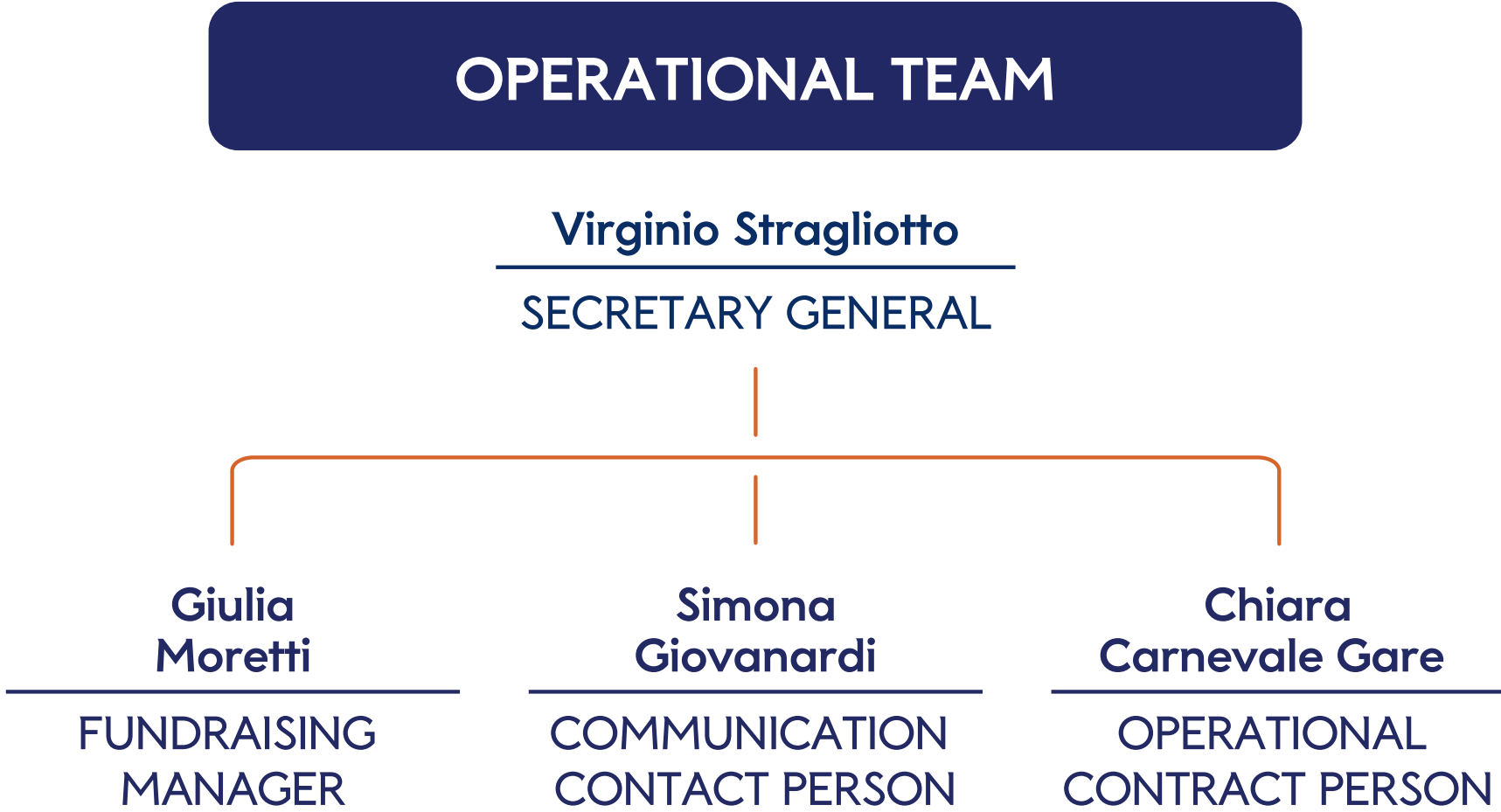
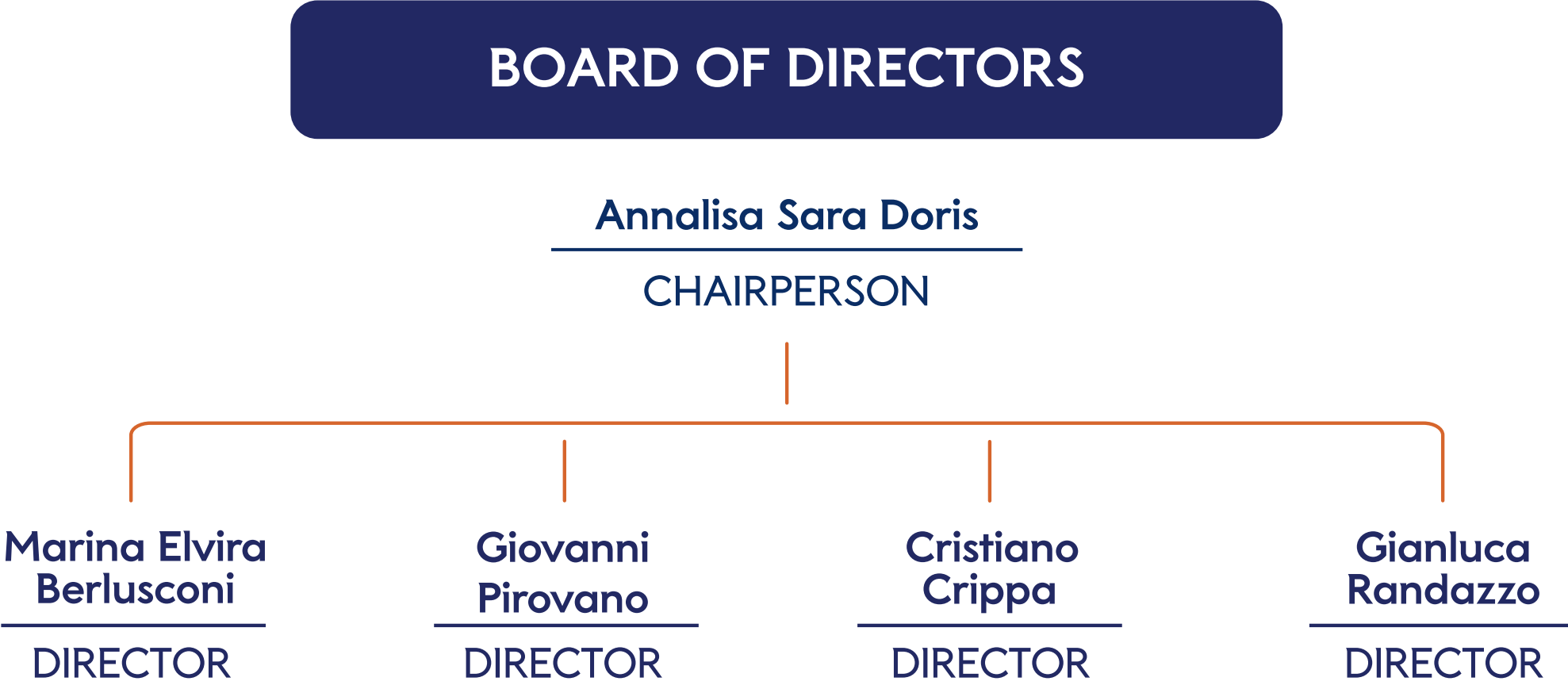
Statutory Auditor

In the cases set forth by law or if deemed appropriate, the **Founder appoints an independent auditor or an independent auditing firm enrolled in the appropriate register.** The independent audit can be assigned to the Supervisory Body; in this case, all its members must be chosen from the auditors listed in the appropriate register.

The Supervisory Board and the Auditor (or Auditing Firm) may be paid a fee in the amount determined by the Founder at the time of appointment, in strict compliance with the provisions of Art. 8, paragraph 2, of the Third Sector Code.

All the Foundation's bodies were in office from 24/01/2023 until the approval of the financial statements at 31/12/2025.
The institutional offices of Fondazione Mediolanum do not receive any compensation.



2.3 COLLABORATORS

At the beginning of the year, the team in Italy welcomed a new member, with the aim of helping the Foundation to increase fundraising and institutional activity.

The Fondazione Mediolanum operational team will therefore consist of four members in Italy and three in Spain in 2024.

Two members of the Italian team and the entire Spanish team are employees of Banca Mediolanum S.p.A. and Banco Mediolanum S.A., respectively.

The three employees of the Spanish delegation, who as indicated above are employees of Banco

Mediolanum S.A., have been carrying out their activities for the delegation since 2019.

In Italy, Banca Mediolanum S.p.A. formalised, through a letter of secondment renewed annually, the working activity of the first team member from 2011 and the second from 2020. The company is responsible for the economic, social security and regulatory treatment of the seconded personnel, according to the terms of the contract.

The third member of the Italian team has had a contract for the provision of services since 2014, aimed at implementing the communication activity of the Foundation.

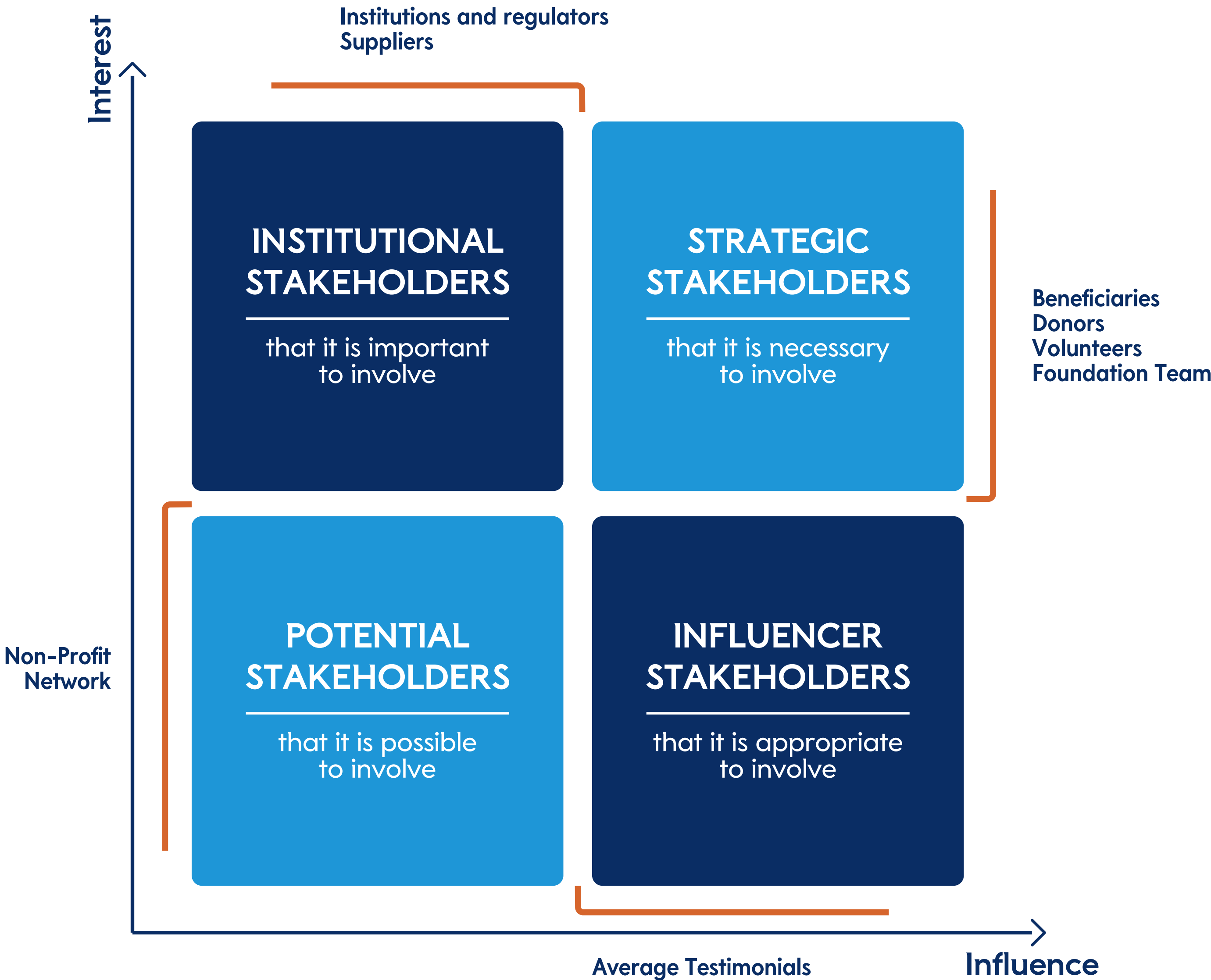
Mapping

Fondazione Mediolanum highly values the trust it has established with its community. **This trust is fundamental to achieving our objectives**, generating value and managing resources effectively. The Foundation is committed to maintaining and strengthening this relationship through **open communication and transparent reporting**.

To ensure this, the Foundation conducted a self-analysis, reflecting on its stakeholders and on the changes imposed by the reform of the Third Sector. This led to a complete mapping of all stakeholders and the initiation of discussions with each representative of the community.

The Foundation recognises the importance of each stakeholder and shares its mission and values with them.

Once the mapping was completed, it proved essential for the Foundation to conduct an analysis aimed at identifying the level of interest and influence of all categories.





Beneficiaries

Fondazione Mediolanum aims to have a **positive impact in the social sector**, offering **assistance and support** to people in difficulty, in particular to minors who are faced with vulnerable situations. As a lender, it believes that building strong relationships with the organisations it evaluates and finances is key to achieving its goal of helping those in need. The Foundation places significant emphasis on the efficiency and effectiveness of its operations.

Donors

Fondazione Mediolanum is a private, non-capitalised foundation. **It receives funds from donors**, including the Founder Banca Mediolanum S.p.A., to carry out its **mission**. The Foundation places **great importance on transparency** in its communication with donors and is committed to making informed decisions.

Volunteers

Volunteers play an essential role in fundraising activities, as they **generously offer their time and availability to the Foundation**. Their contribution is immensely valuable because it allows the Foundation to participate in numerous initiatives and promote the projects it supports. Although the volunteers, recruited by Banca Mediolanum from among the employees of its companies, are all occasional, their involvement is always deeply felt.

Staff

A small number of employees work in the Foundation group. The Team is responsible for the **assessment of the proposed projects**, the planning of **fundraising activities**, and the scheduling and **management of administrative-bureaucratic deadlines**, from institutional meetings to the promotion of the impacts generated by the work of the Foundation across various communication channels.

Suppliers

The Foundation must explore options beyond its resources to make the most of them. This may include requesting **specialist advice** on legal and tax issues or **finding suitable tools**, such as IT platforms or event production teams, to achieve its objectives. The Foundation aims to minimise expenses, while ensuring the availability of the necessary resources.

Institutions and regulators

In its work, Fondazione Mediolanum strictly complies with the **provisions of the law**, fulfilling the obligations established by the responsible bodies.

Media

The Foundation places great emphasis on **open communication and transparency**. It relies on the media to promote its efforts, support fundraising projects or initiatives, reach a wider audience, and maximise impact.

Testimonials

Sharing testimonials is important during events that receive considerable media attention, such as gala dinners and emergency fundraisers. This approach **increases public engagement** more effectively than other forms of call-to-action. The wide and diverse range of supporters can better connect with the approach of the testimonials.

Non-profit network

Fondazione Mediolanum draws inspiration for new initiatives from the activities of other third sector organisations. **The Foundation also values meeting with new organisations** and associations that share similar objectives and areas of intervention. Mutual knowledge sharing makes it possible to launch **collaborative projects**.

2.6 ENGAGEMENT

Through direct involvement and open communication, Fondazione Mediolanum intends to continue building a **strong relationship of trust with its community.**

2.6.a Mediolanum Values Manager

The Mediolanum Values Managers are Family Bankers appointed by their local manager to spread awareness of the Foundation's charitable activities and the Bank's sustainability initiatives.

During 2024, they were involved in regular online meetings with the aim of discussing and stimulating debate on various issues: at the end of June, the Foundation invited around 50 participants, including Family Bankers and their companions, to Dynamo Camp to raise awareness of the importance of increasing use of the "Cents that count" service, of which the organisation has been a beneficiary since 2016.

The work carried out during the year led the Foundation to raise €831,140.46 (+38% compared to 2023) through the "Cents that count" service, while the percentage of activation on target current accounts rose from 12.7% at the end of 2023 to 15.9% at the end of 2024.

2.6.b Mediolanum Charity Ambassador

This title, created to reward the commitment of Banca Mediolanum advisors who stood out for their social action, was awarded to **44 Family Bankers in 2024**, many of whom we met on several occasions throughout the year, as can be seen in the photo on the next page. These professionals qualified for the title by surpassing the valuation metrics indicated by the Foundation and the Bank. It should be noted that the prerequisite for obtaining this qualification is to have, in one's customer portfolio, **a share of activation of the "Cents that count" service equal to or greater than 20%** of the total target accounts.

2.6.c All together for "AISM's Apple"

In 2024, Fondazione Mediolanum renewed its commitment to the Italian Multiple Sclerosis Association (AISM) and, for the first time, took to the streets to support children with multiple sclerosis: the occasion was "AISM's apple", an initiative organised in 5,000 Italian squares from 4 to 6 October.

The collaboration between Fondazione Mediolanum and AISM takes the form of support for the MS PED project, dedicated to children and young people with multiple sclerosis and their families, which aims to help young patients better manage their condition. The main objective is to improve the quality of life of children and teenagers with multiple sclerosis and related conditions. The programme also includes training courses for families to help them cope with the daily challenges posed by the disease. Chronic, unpredictable and often debilitating, multiple sclerosis can affect not only adults but also children. Approximately 14,000 young people under the age of 18 have been diagnosed with multiple sclerosis, but there may be many more who are already living with the symptoms and do not yet know they have it.

On the occasion of the "AISM's apple" initiative, Fondazione Mediolanum doubled the first €50,000 raised to support the project. However, Mediolanum's commitment is not limited to the Foundation's financial contribution: **Banca Mediolanum's Family Bankers have actively joined in both fundraising activities and public activities**, demonstrating once again the bank's commitment to philanthropic causes, particularly those involving children.

2.6.d The annual concert in the Cathedral, “La Musica nel Cuore”

On 26 November 2024, in the splendid setting of Milan Cathedral, the Christmas charity concert “La Musica nel Cuore” took place, an extraordinary event combining music and solidarity.

Organised by Banca Mediolanum together with the Ennio Doris Foundation and Fondazione Mediolanum to support the Buzzi Children’s Hospital Foundation, the concert contributed to the creation of the new Waiting Room at Buzzi Hospital in Milan, the first place where young patients and their families arrive, often worried or distressed, always needing to distract the youngest children in particular while they wait for their tests. The concert was held in a unique atmosphere, thanks to performances by Elisa, Noemi, and Luca Carboni, accompanied by Bandakadabra, GnuQuartet, and Samuel’s incredible artistic direction.

Numerous Family Bankers, clients, employees and suppliers of Banca Mediolanum, investment houses and volunteers were present, occasionally lending a hand and making it possible, thanks to all those who participated in this magical evening, to support a project that is so important for so many young patients.

The initiative makes it possible to furnish the waiting room in the new pavilion of the Children’s Hospital with furniture, painted walls and natural lighting to create a pleasant and welcoming environment. It helps children and families have a peaceful experience, preparing them for treatment and facilitating healing by immersing them in a reality that is in no way frightening.

2.6.e Christmas Shop in partnership with Vidas

There are approximately 35,000 minors in need of paediatric palliative care in Italy, but access to this type of care is only guaranteed to 1 in 20 children.

To respond to this need, in 2015 VIDAS created the first paediatric home palliative care team. Unfortunately, in some cases, it is not possible to assist minors in their homes. For this reason, Casa Solievo Bimbi, the first paediatric hospice in Lombardy and one of eight currently operating in Italy, has been in operation since 2019. It is a facility that bridges the gap between home and hospital, a place of care and love where children are welcomed together with their parents and siblings in six mini-apartments, equipped like a home and accessible to family members 24 hours a day.

From 27 October 2024 to 10 January 2025, VIDAS opened a charity Christmas shop at Via Belfiore 7 in Milan to fully support the Casa Solievo Bimbi paediatric project: every purchase therefore guaranteed care and support for young patients and their families. Fondazione Mediolanum doubled the initial €20,000 raised; in addition, 12 of our volunteers took turns in the shop to provide support to those from VIDAS.

Thanks to this initiative, 22 days of day hospice care are guaranteed for around 40 children, including activities with social and healthcare workers, materials, medicines and coverage of the cost of transporting the children from their homes to the facility. The Day Hospice offers relief to parents, who can take a break and alleviate the tension they experience on a daily basis from having to be constantly present and responsive.

2.6.f The second Charity Dinner of Mediolanum International Funds

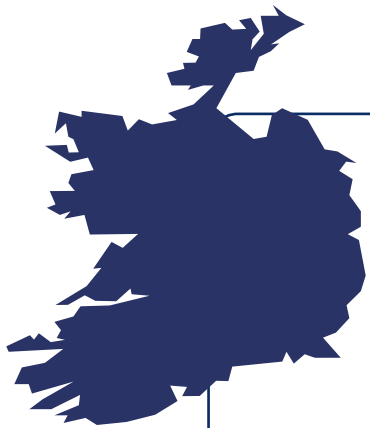
In Ireland, Mediolanum International Funds plays a key role in supporting the local community.

Since 2017, it has supported the Women and Children programme of Coolmine Therapeutic Community, which is run through the Ashleigh Centre, Ireland's only centre dedicated to treating drug addiction in pregnant women and new mothers.

In 2024, Mediolanum International Funds expanded its reach to include the Belvedere Youth Club, an organisation located in the north-east of Dublin, to empower, support and educate children and help them engage in positive activities.

In November, following the success of the 2023 event, the second Mediolanum Philanthropy Collective was held at the EPIC Irish Emigration Museum, resulting in €570,742 being donated to support both programmes.

The aim is to accelerate the creation of another drug and alcohol rehabilitation centre for mothers, newborns and young children in Limerick alongside Coolmine, replicating the successful model of Ashleigh House. At Belvedere Youth Club, however, the contribution will go towards programmes that offer children the opportunity to see the benefits of positive behaviour, through homework clubs, daily hot meals and access to cultural opportunities.

2.6.g Summer party to raise funds for “Children's Heart”

Since 2015, Marco Monetti, a customer of Banca Mediolanum, has been working with his brother Stefano to organise various fundraisers to finance charitable projects. The choice of these projects is **never random**, as in the case of “Amici del cuore” and Le Molinette Hospital, which they became familiar with when caring for their parents who had heart problems.

Every year, in summer, they organise a party and charity event at their villa in Fiano Torinese. In 2024, through Wealth Advisor Diego Data, who is not only Marco's Family Banker but also a personal friend, they decided to entrust Fondazione Mediolanum with the choice of partner: Mission Bambini's “Children's Heart” project, which aims to operate on children with heart disease in the most disadvantaged countries, immediately struck a chord with them and they decided to support it, expressing, as always, their desire to monitor the progress of the funded project by participating in the mission to Uganda, scheduled for 2025, to see first-hand the wonderful work that could be done.

The Blue Party, a fundraiser for “Children's Heart” in Uganda, was held in July, and the Monetti family did not expect such a result: together with Fondazione Mediolanum and Mission Bambini, they managed to engage and raise awareness among the guests about the charitable purpose of the fundraiser to such an extent that donations continued in the days that followed. **A total of €38,625 in donations was collected, which, after Fondazione Mediolanum doubled the initial €30,000, became €68,625.**

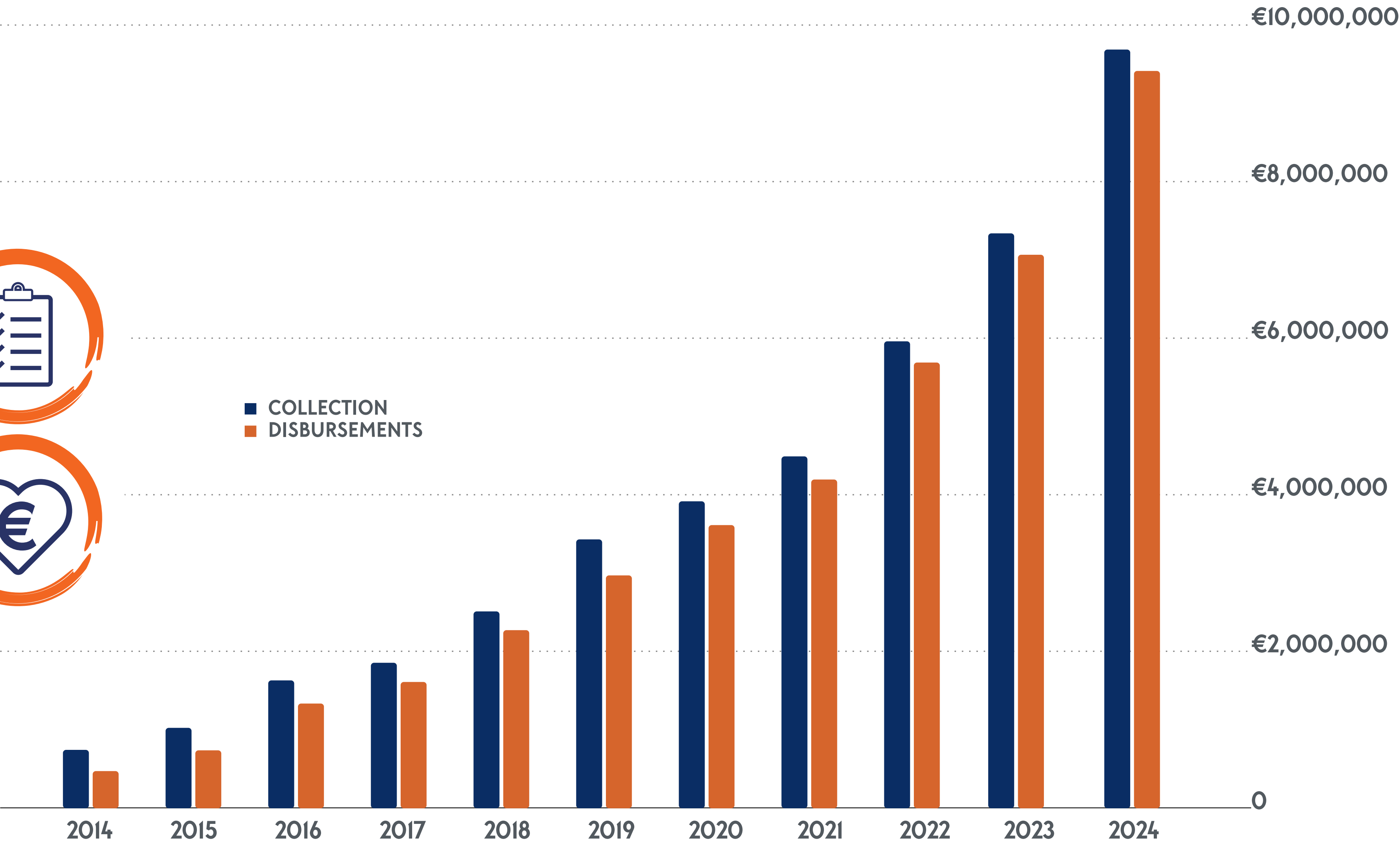


Ten-year results and trends in fundraising and disbursements

Focus on beneficiaries

NPOs that submit projects to Fondazione Mediolanum must specify the number of minors in difficulty affected by the proposed intervention.

While this information is generally readily available for assistance and educational and school projects, it can be more challenging for research and healthcare projects. In some cases, the funded research may not yield significant results, but it may still be useful for future research.

Due to these factors, the number of children helped by the projects funded in 2024 is an estimate and may not be entirely accurate.

Non-profit organisations in Italy and Spain have stated that they can assist a total of 60,000 children with the support of Fondazione Mediolanum.

3.1 SIZE OF THE BENEFICIARY ORGANISATIONS

Before finalising a project with an NPO, Fondazione Mediolanum examines the organisation's financial documents to determine their scope and deduce their effectiveness based on the income statement. For the preparation of this Annual Report, the last three financial statements of each of the **294 organisations and entities** (14 of which received support from the Foundation for two or more projects, for a total of 310 projects supported during the year) that received support from Fondazione Mediolanum in 2024 were assessed.

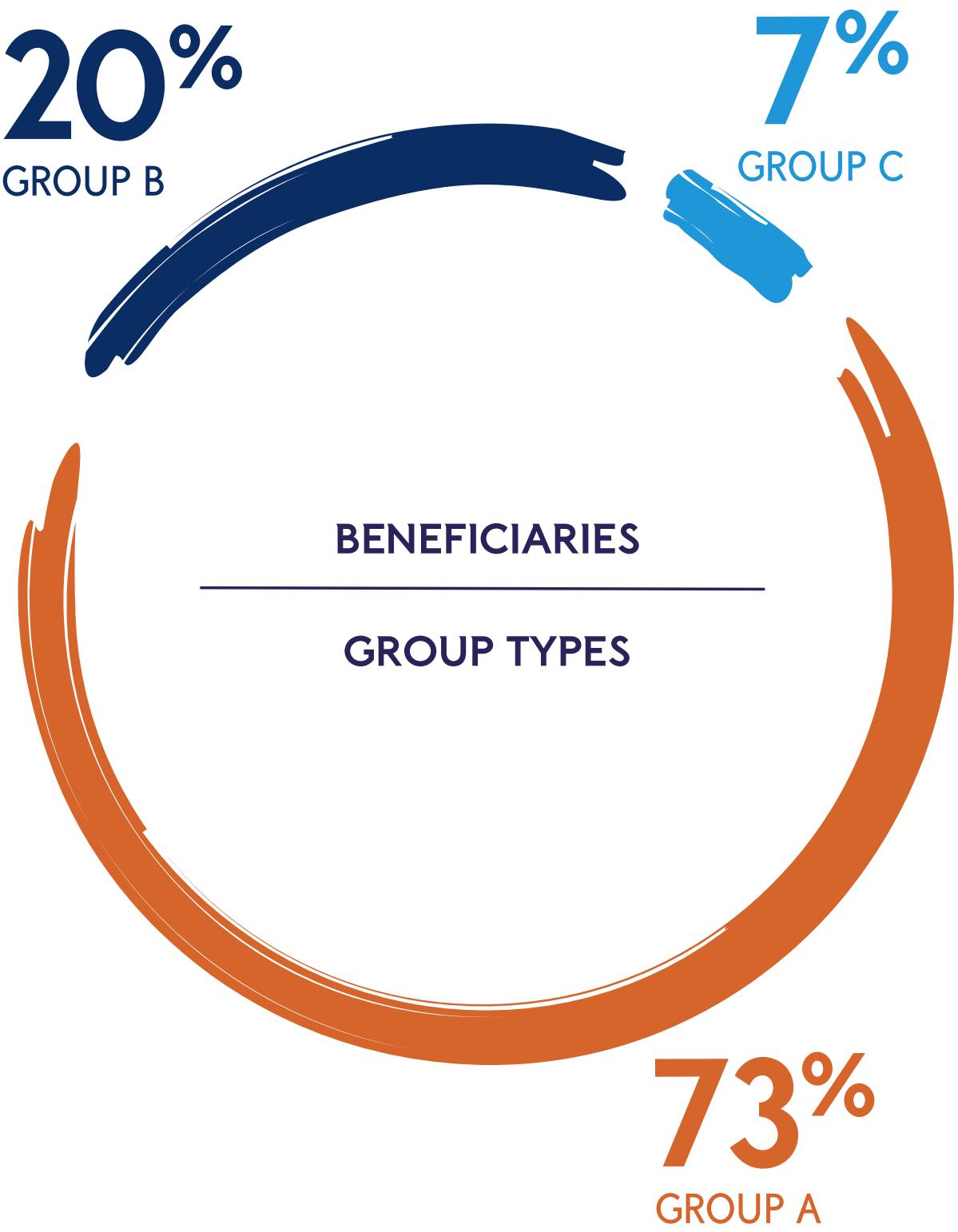
As regards size, **three categories were recognised and each organisation assessed was assigned to one of them.** The criterion for classification within a specific category is the average of the total **revenues** of the three financial statements examined, which allows avoiding inaccurate allocations due to exceptional events that cause atypical results in individual years, both positive and negative.

The characteristics and standards of each category are as follows:

- **GROUP A: Small and medium-sized** organisations/associations/foundations. This group includes organisations with a three-year average of income **between €0 and €999,999.**
- **GROUP B:** Organisations/associations/foundations **of significant size.** This group includes organisations with a three-year average of income **between 1,000,000 and 9,999,999 euro;**
- **GROUP C:** Organisations/associations/foundations **of large size.** This group includes organisations with a three-year average revenue **greater than 10,000,000 euro.**

An examination of the partners with which Fondazione Mediolanum collaborated in 2024 showed the following distribution:

The assessment confirms the **Foundation's propensity to support small- and medium-sized organisations,** enabling a **more immediate exchange of information,** less assessment of intermediate needs and the ability to **customise projects and actions.**

3.2 EVALUATION OF THE EFFICIENCY OF THE BENEFICIARY ORGANISATIONS

The assessment of the partners' financial statements was also useful in determining their efficiency. The information assessed included **total expenses and those specifically linked to the execution of the projects**. The three previous financial statements of each organisation were reviewed to establish an average amount of project expenses and total expenses.

By comparing the expenses of the project with the total expenses, we were able to calculate a percentage that represents the efficiency of the organisation; **a higher percentage means that the analysed organisation is more efficient**.

The expenses associated with the operation of the organisation (rent, utilities, IT equipment, administrative staff), together with communication and fundraising costs and the respective personnel, were considered structural costs, i.e. not directly related to the projects.

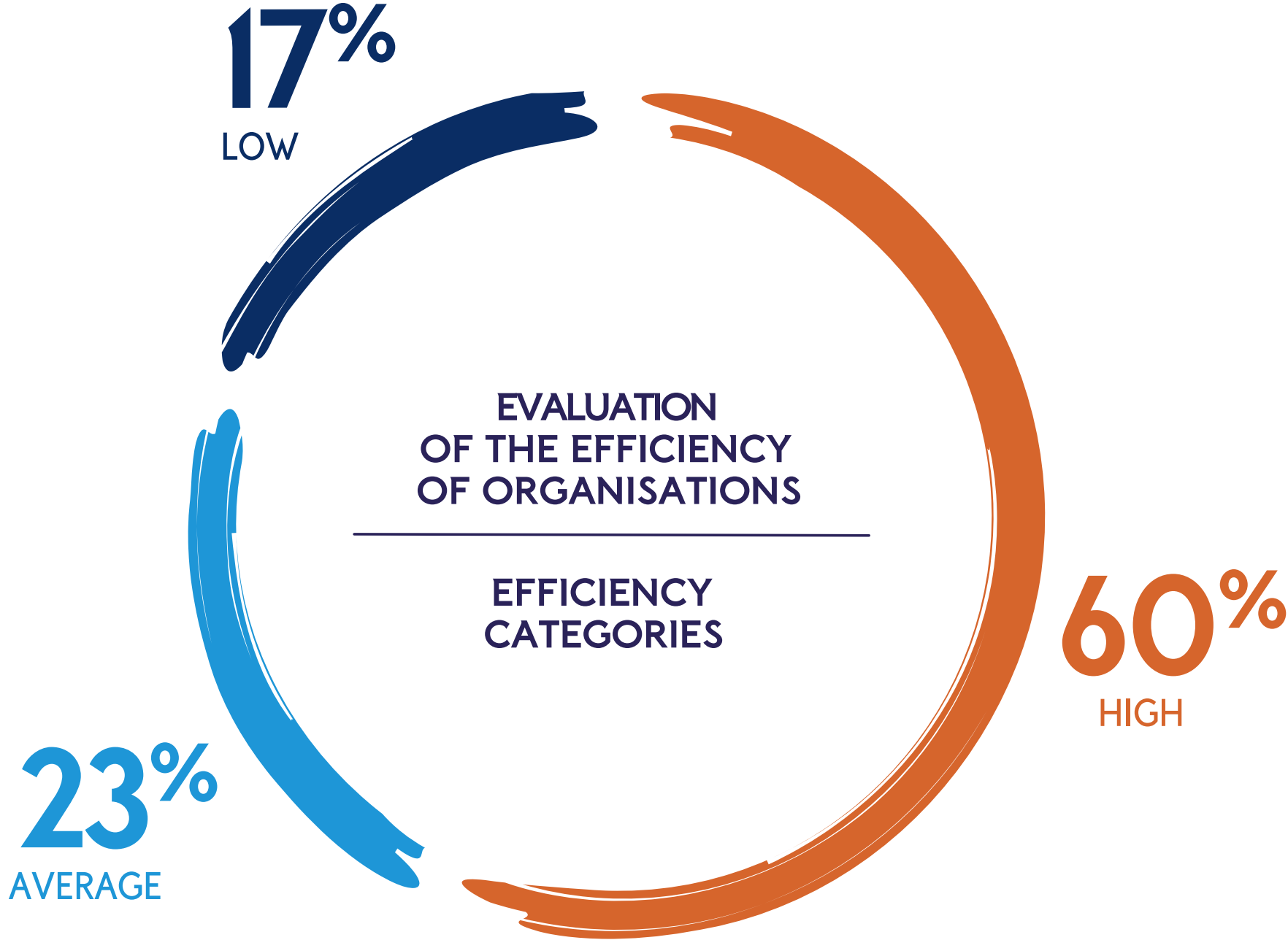
On the contrary, expenses for personnel engaged in projects (such as educators, researchers and professionals) are considered project-specific costs.

Given the above, the **partners with whom the Foundation worked in 2024 were classified into three groups of efficiency**:

- low: the ratio of project costs to total costs is less than 70%;
- average: the ratio of project costs to total costs is between 70% and 85%;
- high: the ratio of project costs to total costs is greater than 85%.

The analysis shows that the majority of partners whose projects were supported by the Foundation in 2024 have a ratio of project costs to total costs that results in an overall average efficiency figure of 83%.

3.3 GEOGRAPHY AND INTERVENTION AREAS

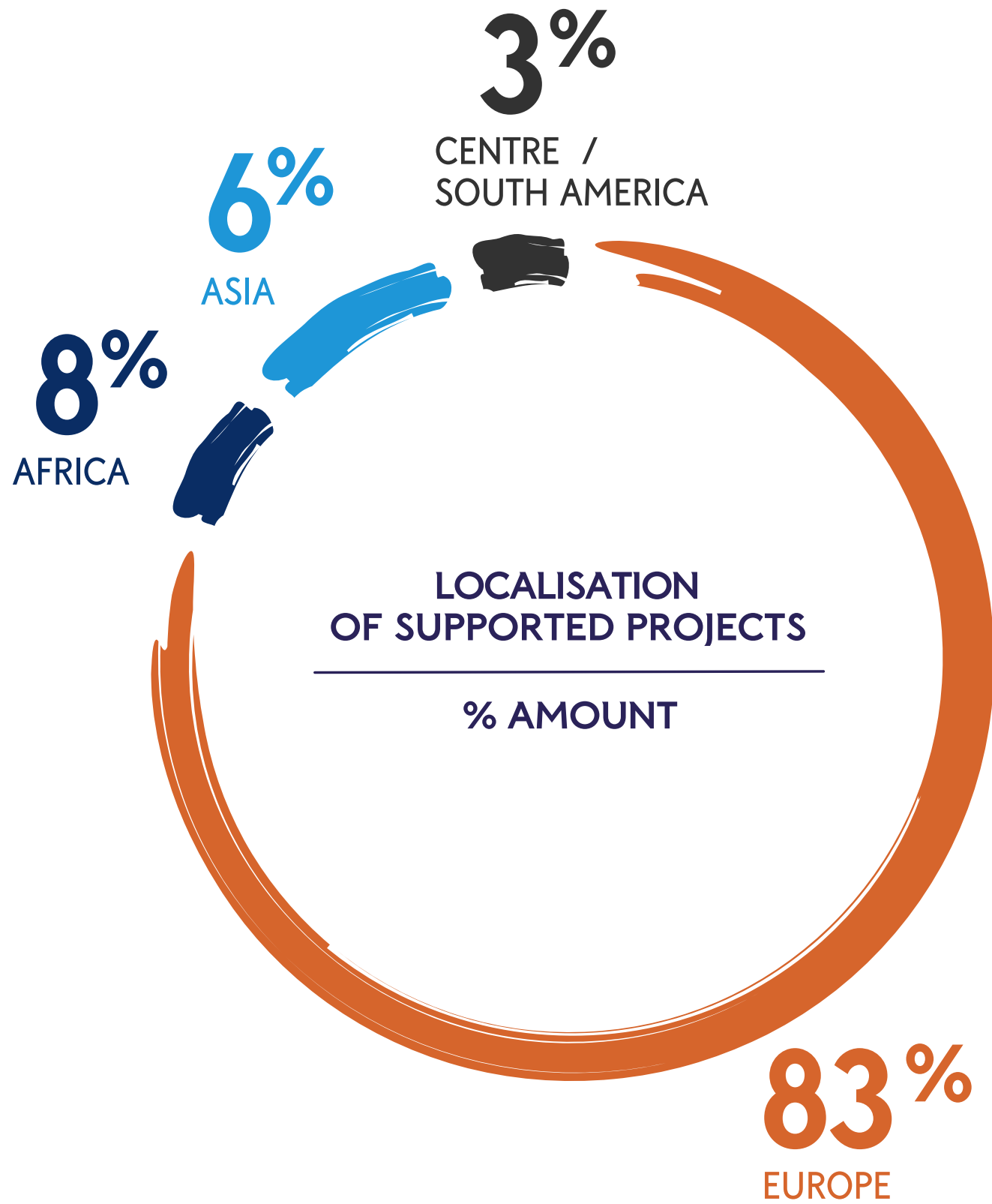
The percentage breakdown based on the continental location of the projects financed is reported below:

Europe is the continent where the greatest number of interventions is concentrated. This is due not only to the extensive presence of projects in Italy and Spain, but also to the Ireland project, for which a large disbursement was made.

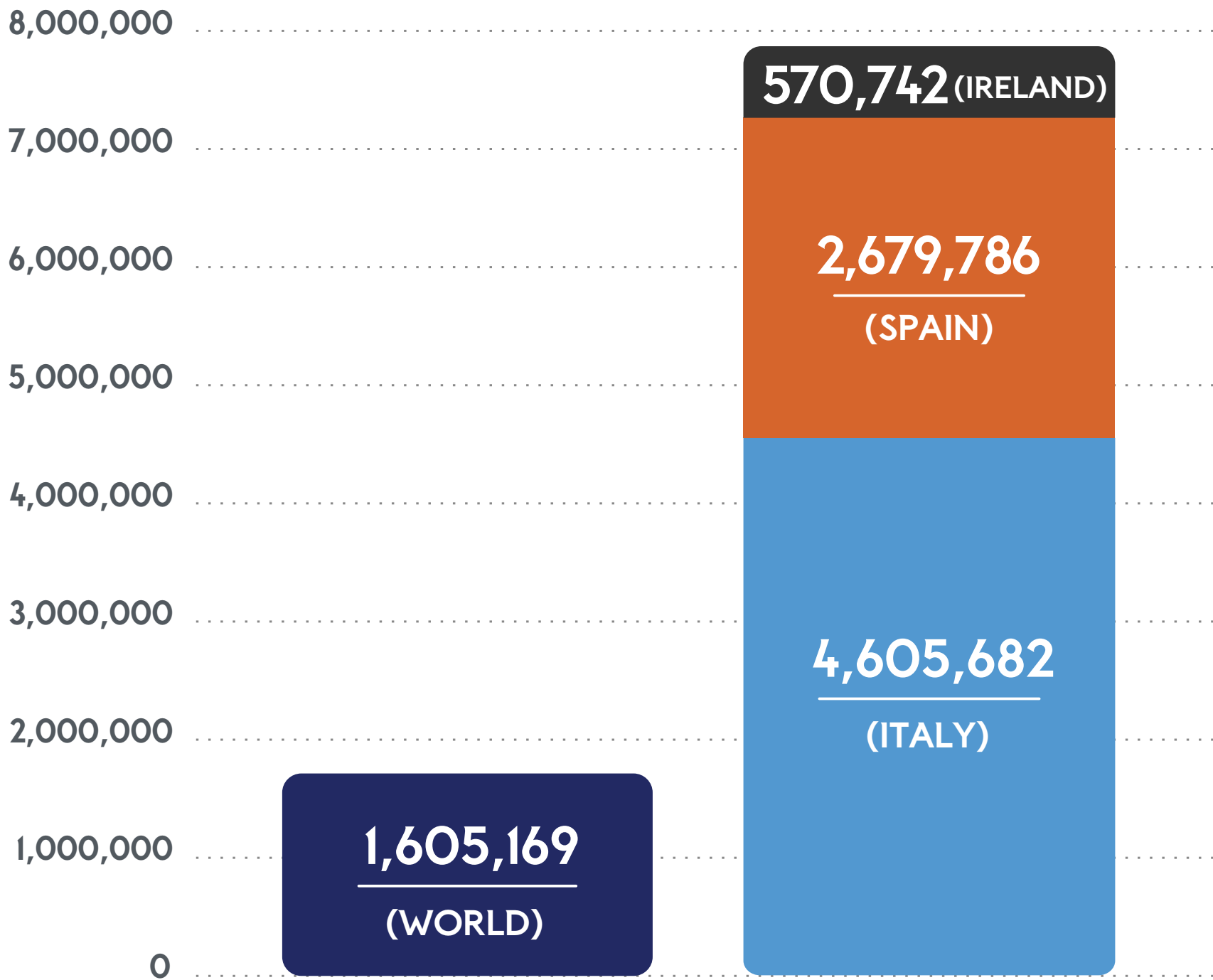
In any case, **the overall percentage for Europe rose significantly from 78% in 2023 to 83% in 2024**. The sharp increase is undoubtedly largely attributable to the disbursement made by the Spanish delegation following the floods in Valencia.

In percentage terms, **the amount allocated to projects in Africa rose by one point compared to 2023**, while the percentage of interventions in Asia halved (from 12% in 2023). Finally, the percentage of funds allocated to projects in Central and South America remained stable at 3%.

As anticipated, disbursements for projects in Spain grew significantly, driven by the post-flood emergency campaign.





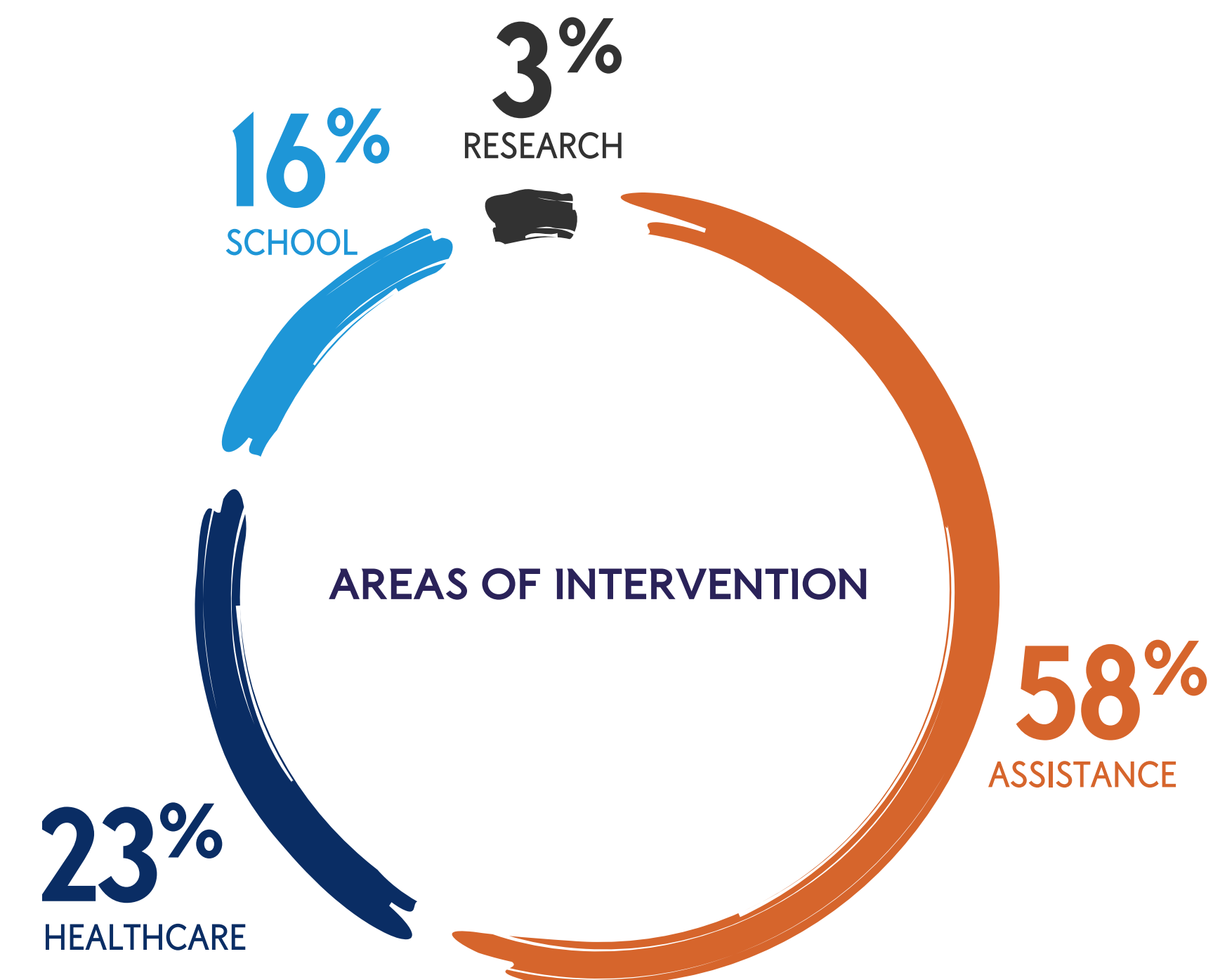

All areas in which the Foundation operates grew in 2024. In particular, **there was significant growth in the educational sector, mainly due to the annual fundraising campaign “I want to go to school”**.

The healthcare and research sectors also showed a sharp increase, both up by 34%. For healthcare, this was due to projects linked to Banca Mediolanum’s CRM initiatives and national fundraising campaigns in collaboration with AISLA and AISM. For research, it was linked to a greater number of Solidarity Events and matching initiatives in both Italy and Spain dedicated to study and research projects.

Assistance remained the main focus in 2024, marking a 24% increase compared to the previous year, which had already been a record year: the further increase is undoubtedly attributable to the funding provided for the project in Georgia and those selected and supported thanks to the 2024 edition of the Mediolanum Philanthropy Collective.



3.4 EXAMPLES OF FUNDED PROJECTS

3.4.a “Let's help them grow, meal after meal” Nutrition-themed cause-related marketing

Once again, the Fondazione Progetto Arca Onlus and Medici con l’Africa CUAMM were chosen by Fondazione Mediolanum as beneficiaries of Banca Mediolanum’s activities for 2024. Banca Mediolanum donated part of the profits from the sale of Mediolanum Future Sustainable Nutrition to support two nutrition-related projects through the Foundation.

The aim of Progetto Arca Foundation’s “Let’s feed the future” project is to **protect 208 children in Italy from food poverty by regularly providing them with food and essential goods through solidarity markets in the country’s main cities.** This ensures they receive adequate nutrition and the neonatal care essential for their development, as well as providing their families with tangible help with a strong education and relational focus. The initiative proposed by Progetto Arca Foundation is part of a broader system to combat poverty and promote social inclusion for families in situations of socio-economic hardship at risk of sliding into absolute poverty. It falls within the scope of support for families and vulnerable individuals, with a particular focus on child poverty generated as a result of the poverty of their families.

Solidarity markets may look like small supermarkets, but in reality they are primarily centres for combating food poverty and social exclusion: not just shops selling food, but places where families in difficulty can find support and services to help them reintegrate into the community and overcome poverty. **In addition to shopping, the services offered by solidarity markets also include a help desk providing advice and guidance on city services,** opportunities for socialising such as workshops and themed meetings, specific consultations with professionals such as nutritionists, educators or financial advisors, guidance on educational and medical services for children, as well as activities that promote the creation of community and mutual aid networks.

In the district of Pujehun, Sierra Leone, **malnutrition levels are particularly high** and there is only one nutritional rehabilitation unit at the district hospital. CUAMM has been present here since 2012, supporting the maternity and paediatric wards with the aim of improving access to healthcare services for children.

CUAMM collaborates with the health authorities and hospital management to: ensure the continued presence of an adequate number of appropriately trained and equipped healthcare workers; guarantee on-the-job training and supervision of healthcare personnel through the presence of an experienced paediatrician; and ensure the availability of medicines and all necessary materials. In addition, **CUAMM provides nutritional supplements and supports families by covering the costs of transport from their community of origin to the hospital and back home** after discharge. Finally, for mothers of hospitalised children, CUAMM organises cooking demonstrations to improve families' knowledge and skills on good practices in nutrition and childcare.

The project "Support for the care unit for malnourished children at the Pujehun Maternity and Children's Hospital" by Medici con l'Africa CUAMM aims to provide support for the care of 85 severely malnourished children through:

- the purchase of medicines and nutritional supplements for hospitalised children
- the payment of salaries for hospital staff and the paediatrician
- the costs of transporting children from home to the healthcare facility and back
- the organisation of cooking demonstrations for the mothers of hospitalised children.

3.4.b “Cents that count” for children with disabilities

“Cents that count” is the Banca Mediolanum service that allows customers to support children at Dynamo Camp and other organisations that deal with disabilities and serious chronic illnesses on a daily basis, for less than one euro per month.

Since 2016, with the funds raised through the “Cents that count” service, Fondazione Mediolanum has been supporting Dynamo Camp to give seriously ill children a week of free recreation in a stimulating and protected environment, where they can socialise, experiment, have fun and face life without barriers.

Dynamo Camp offers free programmes with recreational activities, sports and recreational therapy workshops to children with serious or chronic illnesses, neurodevelopmental disorders or disabilities, their families and siblings, allowing them to regain self-confidence and improve their quality of life.

In 2024 alone, the funds raised made it possible to cover the costs of eight recreational therapy sessions held at the San Marcello Piteglio Camp.

In particular, they were used to cover the costs associated with providing free accommodation at the Camp for a total of 808 Italian and foreign children and young people, 604 of whom suffered from serious or chronic illnesses and 204 of whom were healthy brothers and sisters.

Since 2020, the children at the Centro Benedetta D'Intino have also been beneficiaries of the funds raised through the “Cents that count” service.

Children and young people with Complex Communication Needs (CCN), due to congenital or acquired conditions, cannot rely on oral or written communication to express themselves and determine their own lives, and often have problems with verbal comprehension.

If disability usually constitutes a barrier to social participation, this is even more true for children with severe communication disabilities. Severe difficulties in expressing oneself may stem from the inability to articulate speech, or from intellectual disability preventing the development of cognitive functions, including language. In several cases, these children also have other associated conditions that compromise their ability to participate and sometimes even their overall physical condition.

Thanks to a specialised team of 15 professionals, these children are supported through clinical intervention projects involving Augmentative and Alternative Communication. Every CAA clinical pathway is tailored to the specific needs of each young patient, in order to guarantee targeted responses to their complex relational, communicative, cognitive and social needs.

In 2024, 75 children and young people with Complex Communication Needs (CCN), who cannot rely on oral or written communication to express their thoughts, were provided with the necessary care, helping them to acquire communication skills through Augmentative and Alternative Communication techniques.

Furthermore, since 2021, the Lega del Filo d'Oro has also been added to the beneficiaries of the fundraising campaign.

The "First step" project involves a comprehensive three-week programme structured in several phases. Initially, the family contacts the Lega del Filo d'Oro through their local health authority. After initial checks on the documentation, the social worker places the person on a waiting list for admission to the Osimo Diagnostic Centre. The family then stays for three weeks in the flats built inside the Diagnostic Centre: during this period, an interdisciplinary analysis is carried out involving professionals from many various fields. After assessing each child's residual abilities, they work on different aspects: through speech therapy, they identify methods for communication; **through physiotherapy and play, they work on motor skills; and through stomatognathic stimulation, they address difficulties such as swallowing and chewing.** Together with the parents, all of this aims to build a rehabilitation programme that focuses on the child and their real potential for improvement. The intervention is conducted by an interdisciplinary team whose main purpose is to develop a personalised work plan, implement it and evaluate the results over time. **Thanks to donations collected in 2024, it was possible to improve the quality of life of 80 deafblind children, both through early interventions providing personalised diagnosis by a specialised team, and through intensive treatments lasting an average of three weeks, aimed at monitoring and reviewing their rehabilitation progress.**

3.4.c “I want to go to school” fundraising campaign

There are 3 million children in Italy living in absolute or relative poverty, which very often also amounts to educational poverty. Without the opportunity to learn, educate themselves, acquire skills and cultivate passions and abilities, these children suffer a new kind of loneliness: according to data from the 2021 With Children Report, every year 150,000 of them drop out of school and more than 6,000 classes disappear.

In most cases, they leave school due to financial difficulties, but often emotional difficulties, learning disorders, and unfavourable school and social experiences also contribute to dropping out. The recent pandemic has exacerbated all these problems.

For this reason, through the “I want to go to school” fundraising campaign, Fondazione Mediolanum has decided to take action to prevent and combat early school leaving by supporting minors at risk of dropping out of school, together with Fondazione L'Albero della Vita ETS, Il Manto Societa' Cooperativa Sociale and CIAI - Centro Italiano Aiuti all'Infanzia ETS.

Fondazione Mediolanum doubled the initial €60,000 raised and, at the end of the campaign, thanks to the generous contributions of donors, **€393,186.34 were disbursed to guarantee support and extracurricular educational enhancement for one year.**

Thanks to all the people who supported us, we were able to guarantee the right of 860 children at risk of dropping out of school to receive an education.

Specifically, the following is guaranteed:

- educational support in the suburbs of Genoa, Perugia, Naples, Catanzaro and Palermo, **for 60 children aged between 6 and 14 per city**, for a total of 300 minors, in collaboration with Albero della Vita;
- educational support for **250 children and teenagers aged between 6 and 18**, with experiential workshops and mentoring programmes thanks to Cometa's “Light on my steps” project;
- educational support activity for **310 children in Ciai educational centres** in Milan, Bari and Palermo throughout the year, with the addition of summer camps in Milan and Palermo in the summer of 2025.



3.4.d Bicycles for safe travel to school in India

For hundreds of girls in rural villages in Tamil Nadu, India, going to school is a daily challenge.

Walking for miles, often facing risks such as violence and abduction, leads many of them to abandon their studies and lose every opportunity for a better future.

The "A Bike for School" project aims to change all this by donating bicycles to the 500 poorest and most vulnerable girls, allowing them to reach school safely and stay away from dangers, attend classes regularly, improve their academic performance and continue their studies through secondary school, thus avoiding the risk of early marriage and exploitation.

Fondazione Mediolanum has doubled its funds to help more girls.

At the end of the initiative, 500 bicycles were donated to girls from the poorest castes to ensure:

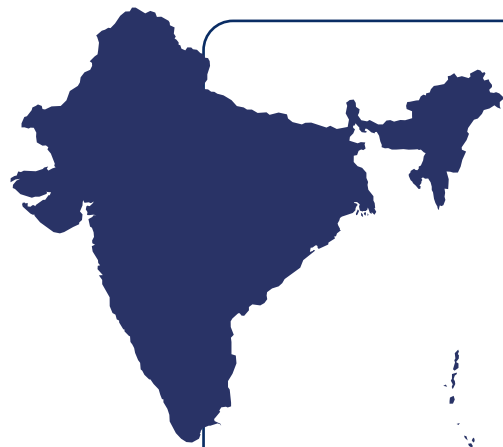
- greater safety on the journey between home and school and less dangers along the route;
- greater protection from harassment and violence;
- increase in the number of girls completing secondary school;
- decrease in early marriages thanks to continued education;
- greater community awareness of girls' right to schooling and safety.

3.4.e Safe water for children in Guinea-Bissau

The project is part of a wider initiative by ACRA to improve access to safe drinking water in the Bolama-Bijagos archipelago in Guinea-Bissau, by upgrading the existing water supply network in the city of Bolama, which is currently insufficient and unsuitable for domestic consumption by children and families.

ACRA will guarantee access to drinking water for 700 children and 4,000 other residents of Bolama through the construction of a 2,700-metre water network, with the creation of 13 public fountains equipped with multiple water taps and the construction of 17 additional connections to reach districts of the city that are currently without water. These will be located throughout the region and also positioned near four schools.

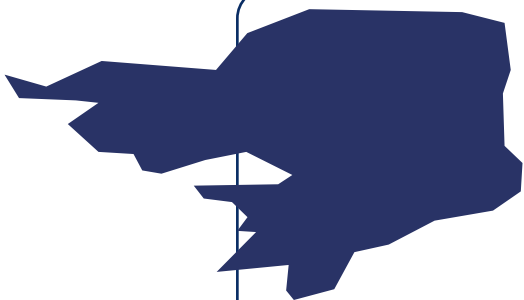
In 2024, the project resulted in the construction of a 196-metre-deep well, which tapped into a new aquifer and can meet the water needs of the population. Previously, water was only available for 30 minutes a day and was scarce during the dry season.

3.4.f Dignity through work for the young people of Cascina Don Guanella

The initiative is part of the broader Cascina Don Guanella social agriculture project, launched in 2014 with the aim of responding to the needs of many minors and young people, unaccompanied foreign minors or those coming from the criminal justice system. After carefully structuring and creating accommodation, training and work opportunities in the agricultural sector, the next step is to bring the project to fruition by renovating the old farmhouse, turning it into a tourist accommodation facility and creating new training and work opportunities.

The renovation of the old farmhouse is necessary to make it suitable for holiday farm stays and to create new opportunities for hospitality, training, professionalism and work for many young people that do not have a family capable of guiding them towards full independence: minors facing serious problems in forming their identity, sometimes severely affected in terms of mental balance; first- or second-generation young migrants struggling with conflicting pressures of belonging and self-definition, in search of new life prospects. These are young people struggling with new forms of poverty and deprivation, not only economic but also relational. Many come from the criminal/juvenile justice system, already burdened with the stigma of deviance.

Through this initiative, 200 young people who have experienced marginalisation and failure are guided to regain hope and the ambition to achieve their own independence.

3.4.g Humanitarian emergencies

With the aim of ensuring respect for human rights and protecting the civilian population, especially the most vulnerable in Beirut and the regions of Mount Lebanon, South Lebanon and Bekaa, Fondazione Mediolanum has decided to work alongside AVSI to provide unhindered access to protection and basic assistance for internally displaced persons in areas affected by the conflict in Lebanon: water and food, mattresses and blankets, shelter, hygiene kits and other basic necessities.

The conflict in Lebanon is raising ongoing concerns in terms of respect for human rights and the protection of the civilian population, especially the most vulnerable in Beirut and the regions of Mount Lebanon, the South and the Bekaa. Since 8 October 2023, when hostilities began, the population has fled southern Lebanon, although some families have chosen to stay due to limited resources and lack of options. The United Nations is working with national authorities and partners to trace and register new displaced persons, but despite these efforts, the influx of internal displaced persons is creating disastrous conditions for local communities.

Thanks to this intervention, we have provided 1,500 children and their families with food, emergency hygiene and health kits, and intensive psychosocial support through art for children, including boys and girls with disabilities. We also provided multi-purpose cash assistance (MPCA) to enable them to cover their essential needs; intensive psychosocial support for families and young people; and a telephone helpline for remote emergency counselling.

Following the tragic incidents of 7 October 2023 when Hamas militias attacked the population of Israel and the subsequent violent response by the Israeli army that affected the entire population of the Gaza Strip, the situation also significantly deteriorated in the West Bank and East Jerusalem.

In this context, Pro Terra Sancta identified as a priority the need to **implement assistance programmes through the distribution of basic necessities and psycho-social protection and support activity for the population of Gaza, the West Bank and East Jerusalem**, within the specific context of the prolonged humanitarian crisis and recent conflict.

Fondazione Mediolanum immediately offered its support for Pro Terra Sancta's emergency strategy to **strengthen the first-aid operations for displaced persons left homeless and to distribute food, emergency kits, blankets and clothing to displaced persons sheltered within the parish.**

The intervention also **provided psychosocial support to around 3,000 children, including children with disabilities**, in two refugee camps in Gaza.

Finally, **support was provided to a group of female embroiderers in their efforts to build resilience** and offer their micro-enterprise, Kenar, a long-term economic opportunity through collaboration with the Pro Terra Sancta Bazaar in Bethlehem.

Fondazione Mediolanum doubled the initial €40,000 raised by Pro Terra Santa with the aim of helping as many families as possible.

In October 2024, Spain was hit by terrible flooding, which affected several regions in the south-east of the country, particularly the Valencian Community, Castile-La Mancha and Andalusia, making it one of the worst natural disasters in the history of Spain.

In addition to the hundreds of thousands of victims, injured or missing, the floods left dozens of families trapped by the water in various locations in the Valencian Community and Castile-La Mancha.

Banco Mediolanum and the Spanish Delegation of Fondazione Mediolanum immediately launched a fundraising campaign and pledged to double the amount raised, up to a maximum of €1,000,000: all together, to help the Spanish Red Cross provide basic assistance and essential goods to hundreds of people who lost everything in a matter of hours.

In addition to the **€528,688** in donations collected, another **€528,688** was added to reach the final figure of **€1,057,376**. At the end of the collection, the Spanish Red Cross received a donation of **€1,057,376**.

4.1 VERIFICATION OF PROJECT PROGRESS

In 2024, thanks to Banca Mediolanum's "Little big dreams" initiative, Fondazione Mediolanum supported three associations operating in major Italian paediatric hospitals to provide greater treatment opportunities for many young patients and their families.

At the end of the charity initiative, the Bank donated €441,319 to Fondazione Mediolanum, which distributed the entire amount in equal parts to support children undergoing treatment at the Giannina Gaslini Institute in Genoa, the IRCCS Materno Infantile "Burlo Garofolo" in Trieste and the Santobono Pausilipon Hospital in Naples. The official handover of the donations provided an opportunity to visit the organisations receiving support.

hospital stay. These professionals offer emotional support to help patients cope with their hospitalisation and are available every day in the Surgery ward. The daily activities in the ward to support hospitalised children are also important, helping young patients to process their hospital experience and associate it with less traumatic memories. This was complemented by the donation of specialised, cutting-edge equipment to the IRCCS Burlo Garofolo hospital.

The donation was officially presented on 16 April during a press conference that concluded with the symbolic presentation of a giant cheque by Sara Doris, Chairperson of Fondazione Mediolanum and Vice-Chairperson of Banca Mediolanum, who publicly announced the amount raised for the organisation operating in Trieste.



4.1.a Well-being in the ward for children undergoing surgery at Burlo Hospital

The "Care within care: well-being on the ward" project provides a series of integrated services to support 800 minors undergoing complex surgical procedures at the Burlo Garofolo Hospital in Trieste. It starts with psychological support after prenatal diagnosis, with a psychotherapist accompanying the family from the first ultrasound scan, during which a malformation may be diagnosed. The service aims to provide support to parents throughout the entire surgical and therapeutic process. After birth, for those children who have to undergo surgery in the early years of their lives and during childhood, two psychologists assist them during their





4.1.b Accommodation for the families of young patients undergoing treatment at Gaslini Hospital

The Gaslininsieme Foundation's "Adopt the Gaslini Families" project aims to welcome the families of young patients who come from outside the region or from other countries. It covers the families' food and accommodation expenses for one year, allowing them to be close to and care for their children who need a long stay at the Giannina Gaslini Institute.

Every year, the Hospitality and Social Services Desk at the Giannina Gaslini Institute handles a total of 1,860 requests, mainly for logistical, organisational and recreational support, but also for accommodation for the families of hospitalised children from outside the region or from other countries. Welcoming and supporting means being able to provide answers and assistance every day: not just food and accommodation, but also logistical, organisational and recreational support.

The ceremony to present the symbolic maxi-cheque took place in September, and was attended by the General Manager of the G. Gaslini Institute, Renato Botti, the Secretary General of Gaslininsieme Ets, Anna Zanuttini, and the Chairperson of Fondazione Mediolanum and Vice-Chairperson of Banca Mediolanum, Sara Doris.

The funds provided will make it possible to guarantee 400 families of children undergoing treatment at the Giannina Gaslini Institute in Genoa the financial support they need to enable family members to be close to their children and care for them during their long hospital stays.

4.1.c Research in paediatric oncohaematology in the laboratories of Santobono Hospital

Paediatric cancers are still the leading cause of death from disease in children. Paediatric cancer (leukaemia, lymphoma and solid tumours) affects 1 in every 650 children under the age of 15. Every year there are 120-140 new cases per million children under the age of 15. Unfortunately, these figures are rising slightly year after year.

The aim of the "Supporting Research in Paediatric Haematology and Oncology" project is to create laboratories within the hospital to work on the development of personalised protocols that can provide effective responses even for 150 patients who do not respond to normal treatment protocols.

Some types of cancer, in their most common forms such as acute lymphocytic leukaemia, have a high chance of recovery thanks to the use of international chemotherapy protocols, which are the result of important research conducted over time on young patients.

Research, therefore, is the key to improving care for young patients. Investing in research means investing in the possibility of making treatments for children less invasive, thereby reducing hospital stays and helping them return to their normal lives as soon as possible.

The cheque presentation ceremony took place in May, with the appearance of the Chairperson of Fondazione Mediolanum, Sara Doris, the

General Manager of AORN Santobono Pausilipon, Rodolfo Conenna, and the Director and President of Fondazione Santobono Pausilipon, Flavia Matrisciano and Anna Maria Ziccardi.

The meetings with the guests and their families were full of heartfelt emotions.





4.2.c Let's celebrate together at the Centro Benedetta d'Intino

For the Centro Benedetta d'Intino, 2024 was also a year of celebration.

On 14 September, the Centro Benedetta d'Intino Onlus celebrated its first 30 years of activity with an event dedicated to families who attend the facility's Augmentative and Alternative Communication sector: an afternoon of sharing with testimonials, music and lunch in the courtyard.

Since 2020, the Centre has been a beneficiary of Fondazione Mediolanum's fundraising through Banca Mediolanum's "Cents that count" service. For this reason, the Foundation took part in the celebrations together with several Mediolanum Values Managers and Mediolanum Charity Ambassadors in order to see first-hand the lives of the children supported thanks to the clients who joined the service.

4.3 THE MISSION IN PERU

Safer homes for families in Lima

At the end of April, Virginio Stragliotto, Secretary General of Fondazione Mediolanum, together with several Mediolanum Charity Ambassadors, travelled to Lima (Peru) with We Care to build eight prefabricated wooden houses for families living in extreme poverty in the suburbs of Lima.

In Peru, 55% of the population lives below the poverty line. WeCare has always operated in two of the toughest areas of the country: the Pamplona slum within the city of Lima and the Canete slum on the outskirts of the capital. Over the years, volunteers have built and donated over 500 prefabricated houses, two sports fields, a church and numerous “minor” but hugely impactful projects to the Peruvian population, such as the construction of stairs in Pamplona, which is located on a very steep hill and becomes impassable during the rainy season. All these projects are aimed at improving the conditions of minors, who are present in large numbers in the slums.

Reducing the extreme poverty in which these people live has a highly positive impact, and close collaboration with local associations makes it possible to correctly identify the families in need of assistance. In 15 years of activity, over 95% of the donated facilities are in excellent condition and are still being used for their intended purpose. The main objective behind the construction of housing, in addition to fulfilling one of the fundamental rights in the United Nations Charter - the “right to housing” - is to create a hygienic, healthy

space that can also provide a “private” area for the people who will live there, ensuring a warm, dry and leak-free environment, reducing concerns about domestic theft in homes and reducing conflicts over lack of space.

5.1 CRITERIA APPLIED

The criteria applied in the valuation of financial statement items, in the value adjustments and in the conversion of values not originally expressed in the legal tender of the State, as well as any consolidations and eliminations of financial statement items with respect to the ministerial model are illustrated below.

The Foundation used the financial statements and Mission Report for Third Sector Entities approved by Italian Ministry of Labour Decree no. 39, as supplemented by OIC 35 Accounting Standard ETS, as they are useful for providing a true and fair view of the Foundation’s operations, in compliance with the provisions of Note no. 19740 of 29 December 2021 issued by the Ministry of Labour and Social Policies.

The valuation of the financial statement items was conducted based on the general criteria of prudence and accrual and on going concern assumptions. The application of the principle of prudence entailed the individual valuation of the elements making up the individual entries or items of the assets or liabilities, to avoid offsetting losses that should have been recognised against profits that should not have been recognised as they were not realised. There were no exceptional cases that made it necessary to resort to exceptions pursuant to art. 2423 paragraph 5 of the Italian Civil Code.

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with the provisions of accounting standard OIC 35. The Organisation availed itself of the right to measure receivables and payables without applying the amortised cost valuation criterion and discounting, as required by the relevant Italian OIC accounting

standards of reference. Specifically, the following measurement criteria were adopted in preparing the financial statements:

Fixed assets

- intangible assets: no investments in intangible were made assets during the financial year under review.
- materials: no investments in tangible assets were made during the financial year under review.
- financial: no financial investments were made during the financial year under review.

Receivables

Receivables are recognised in the financial statements at their nominal value.

Cash and cash equivalents

The balance represents cash and cash equivalents at their nominal value.

Payables

Payables are recognised at their nominal value.

Accounting for charges

The charges are accounted for according to the accrual principle and also take into account the related portion of VAT as it is non-deductible for the Foundation.

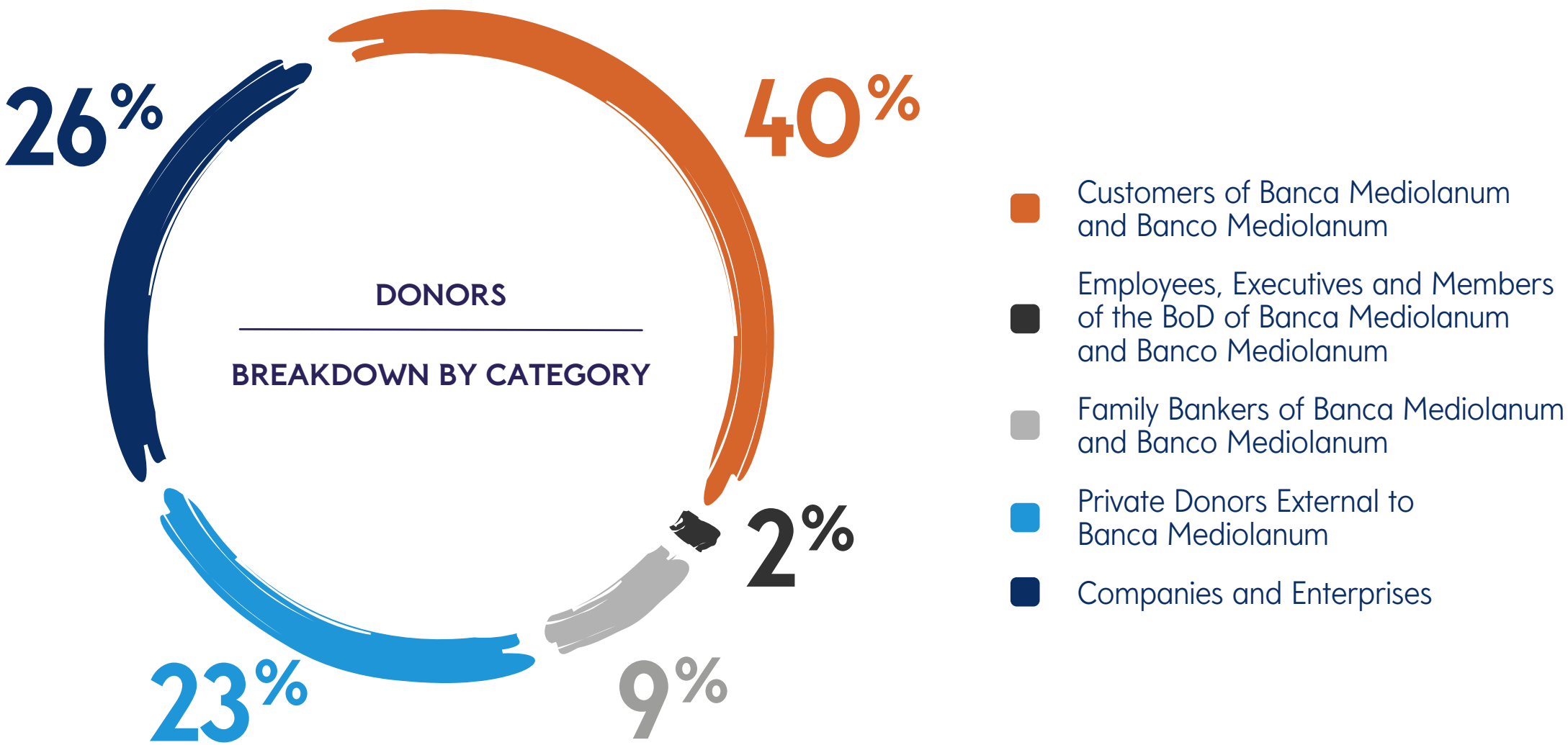

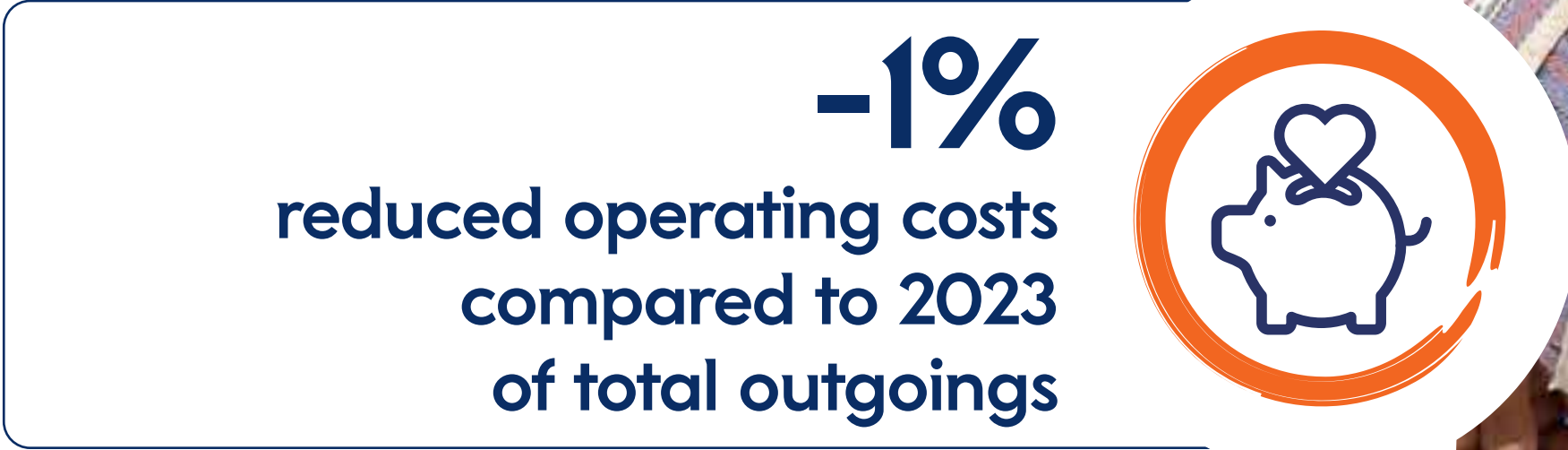
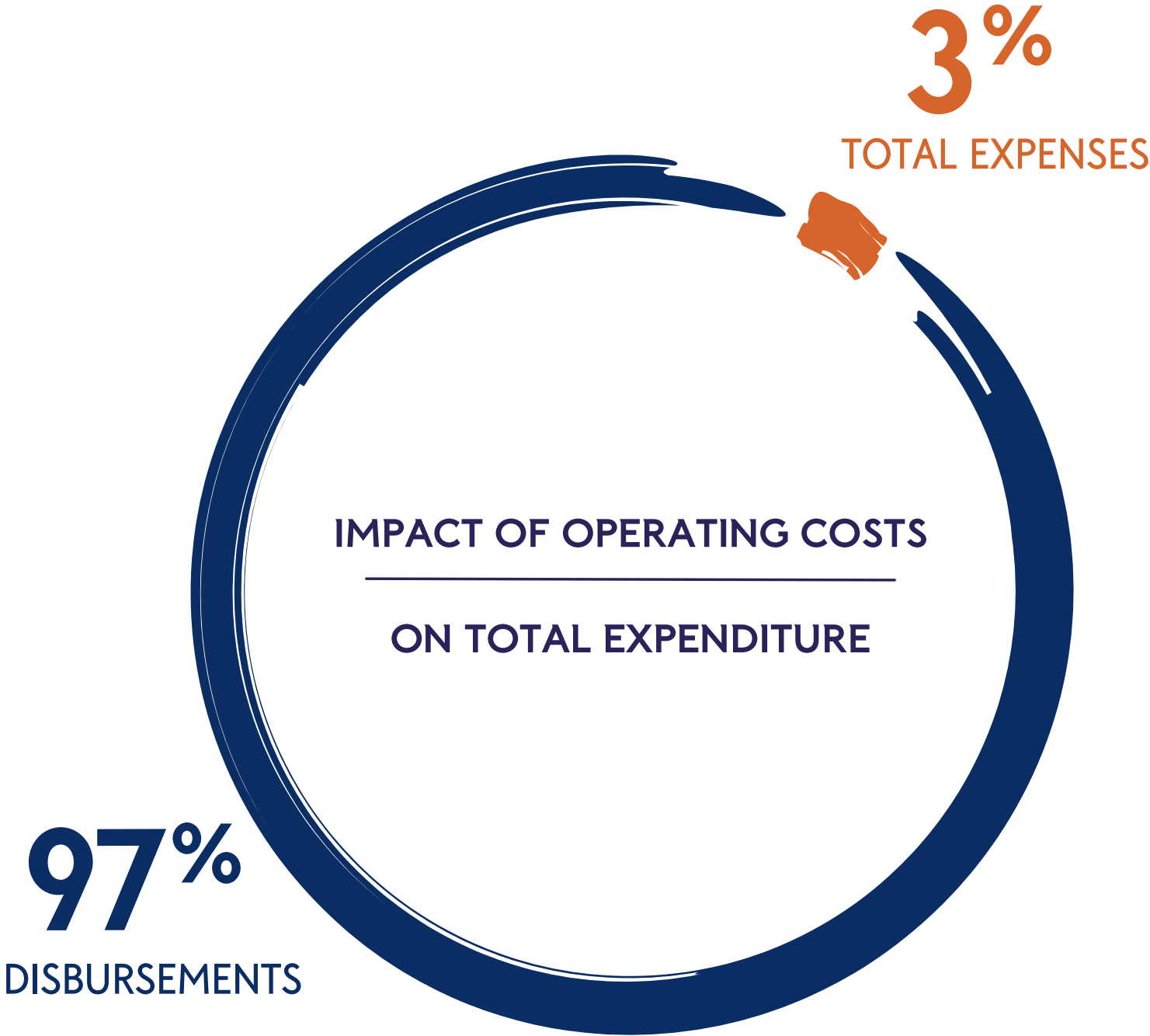
5.4.a Cost management

5.4.b Enhancing communication activities

A prime example of the effective use of resources is the communications area, and in particular the visibility that the Foundation gained through the Italian media throughout the year.

2024 saw a steady media presence for Fondazione Mediolanum, with a focus on solidarity projects, events and interviews that strengthened the bond between the Foundation, social issues and the values inherited from Ennio Doris. Media coverage highlighted a strong consistency between the Foundation's philanthropic activities and its social impact objectives.

The press review was influenced by media activities (national, local and trade press) focusing on key projects and events, the result of collaborations with local institutions and organisations, including solidarity events promoted by Family Bankers.

Media resonance was achieved thanks to the participation of Sara Doris, who promoted values of inclusion and social responsibility at national and local level, with value-driven messages focused primarily on credibility, relationships and trust. Preferring a qualitative rather than quantitative approach, the publications that gave visibility to the Foundation included leading national and local newspapers with a focus on social issues: from Buone Notizie to Avenire, Famiglia Cristiana, and Vita.

Throughout 2024, Fondazione Mediolanum gained significant visibility in the Italian media, with a total of 1,073 articles and mentions in print, online and on television.

The Advertising Value Equivalent (AVE) reached a value of €1,978,594, with a predominantly positive outlook and an OTS* of 127,687,473.

*OTS stands for Opportunity To See and indicates the average number of times the audience is potentially exposed to the message.

6.1 REPORTING OF MONITORING ACTIVITIES

Performed by the Supervisory Body during 2024

In accordance with Article 30, paragraph 7, of the Third Sector Code, during the 2024 financial year, the Board of Auditors monitored Fondazione Mediolanum's compliance with civic, solidarity and social utility purposes, with particular reference to the provisions of Articles 5, 6, 7 and 8 of the Third Sector Code.

This monitoring, carried out in accordance with the current regulatory framework, identified, in particular, the following:

- verification of the exclusive or primary exercise of one or more activities of general interest referred to in Article 5, paragraph I, for civic, solidarity and social utility purposes, in accordance with the specific regulations governing their exercise, as well as, where applicable, activities other than those indicated in Article 5, paragraph I, of the Third Sector Code, provided that they are within the limits of the statutory provisions and based on the criteria of secondary and instrumental nature established by Italian Ministerial Decree No. 107 of 19 May 2021;
- compliance, in the fundraising activities carried out during the reporting period, with the principles of truthfulness, transparency and fairness in relations with supporters and the public, the verification of which - pending the issue of the ministerial guidelines referred to in Article 7 of the Third Sector Code - was carried out on the basis of a comprehensive review of the existing rules and best practices in use;

- the pursuit of a non-profit purpose, through the allocation of assets, including all components (revenues, income, proceeds, receipts of any kind) for the performance of statutory activities; compliance with the prohibition on the distribution, even indirect, of profits, operating surpluses, funds and reserves to founders, members, employees and collaborators, directors and other members of the corporate body taking into account the indices referred to in Article paragraph 3, letters a) to e) of the Third Sector Code.
